





## Class of '94 says goodbye to FP


Saying goodbye is hard, but as we near graduation, we want to say that we've made the best memories of our lives here in the halls of Forest Park.

#### Tech-Prep English offered for seniors








# Social studies classes cover a wide range of subject areas














#### Student Council provides leadership





FFA sponsor Mr. Doug Walker said this club was


one of the most active in the school. He said, "We put almost 5,000 miles on the school van this year." He added that, in every contest event they entered, they qualified for state competition.










### Boys win first CC sectional







#### JV team wins some close games







The Lady Rangers also fared well in the Blue Chip Conference with an 11-6 record.











The excellent group of underclassmen who will return next year coupled with the leadership provided by the seniors this year help to ensure that the Ranger baseball tradition continues. . .



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

### 1993-94. . . The big events

During this school year plans were being made for an addition to Forest Park Junior-Senior High School. Architects from Odle, McGuire, and Shook corporation drew up proposals for the construction. In January, 1994, the school board applied for a State Common School Loan at a special interest rate. FP was not chosen for one of these loans, but, as the school year ended, they were making another application. It looks like construction will begin in the next year or so.


