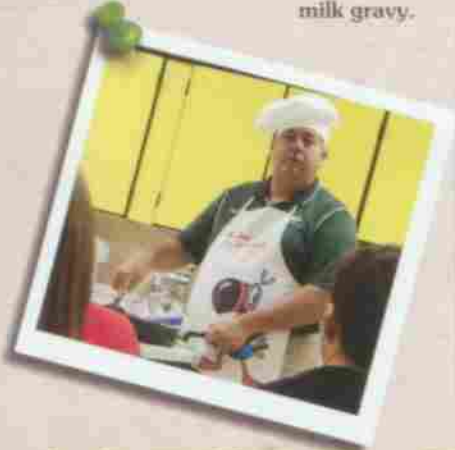

Cornelia "Conny" Winter

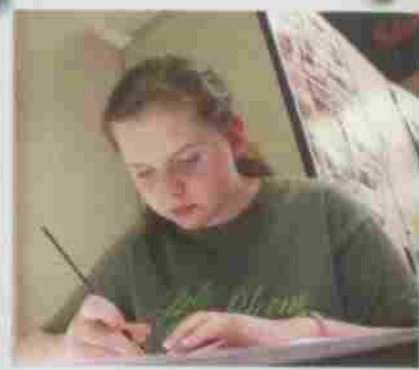

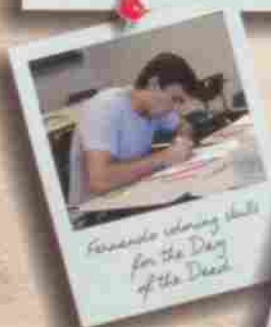

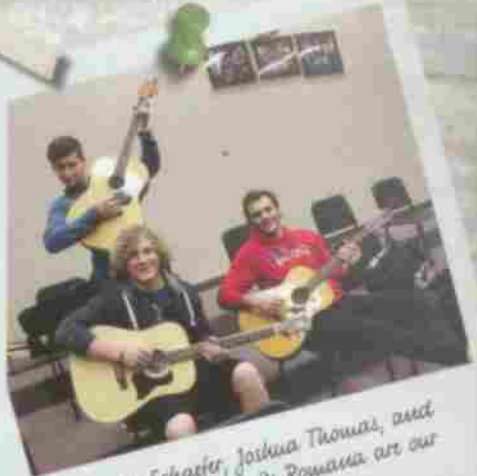

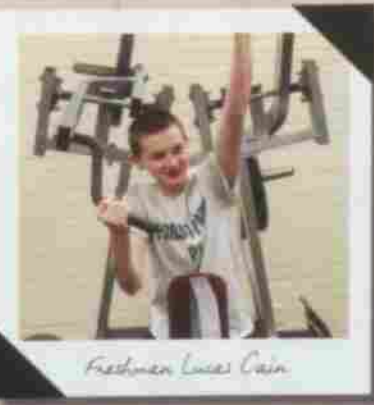

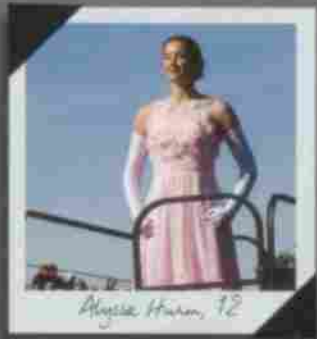

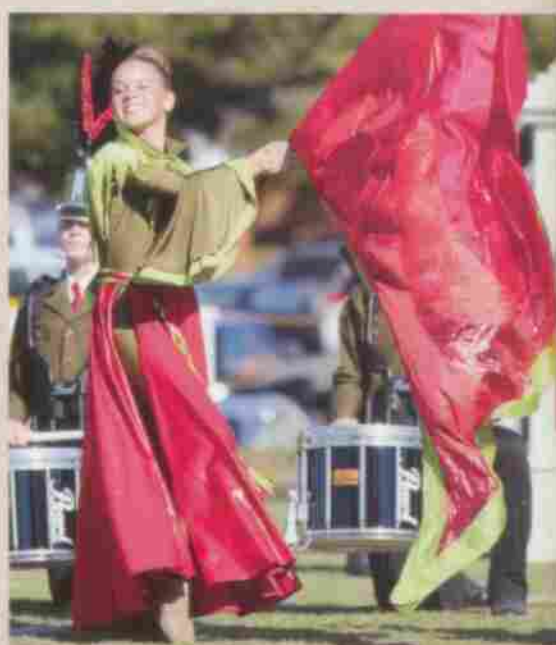

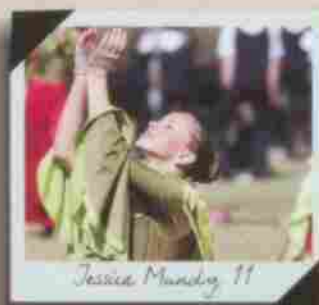

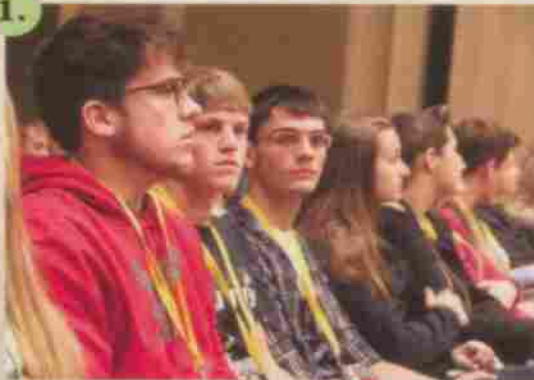

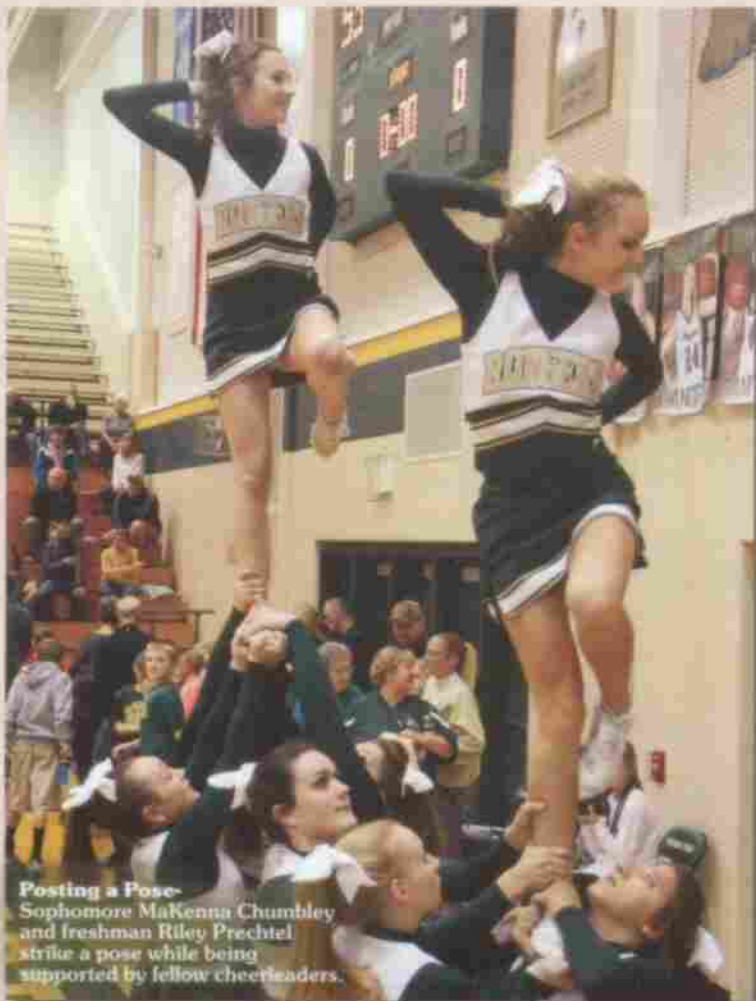

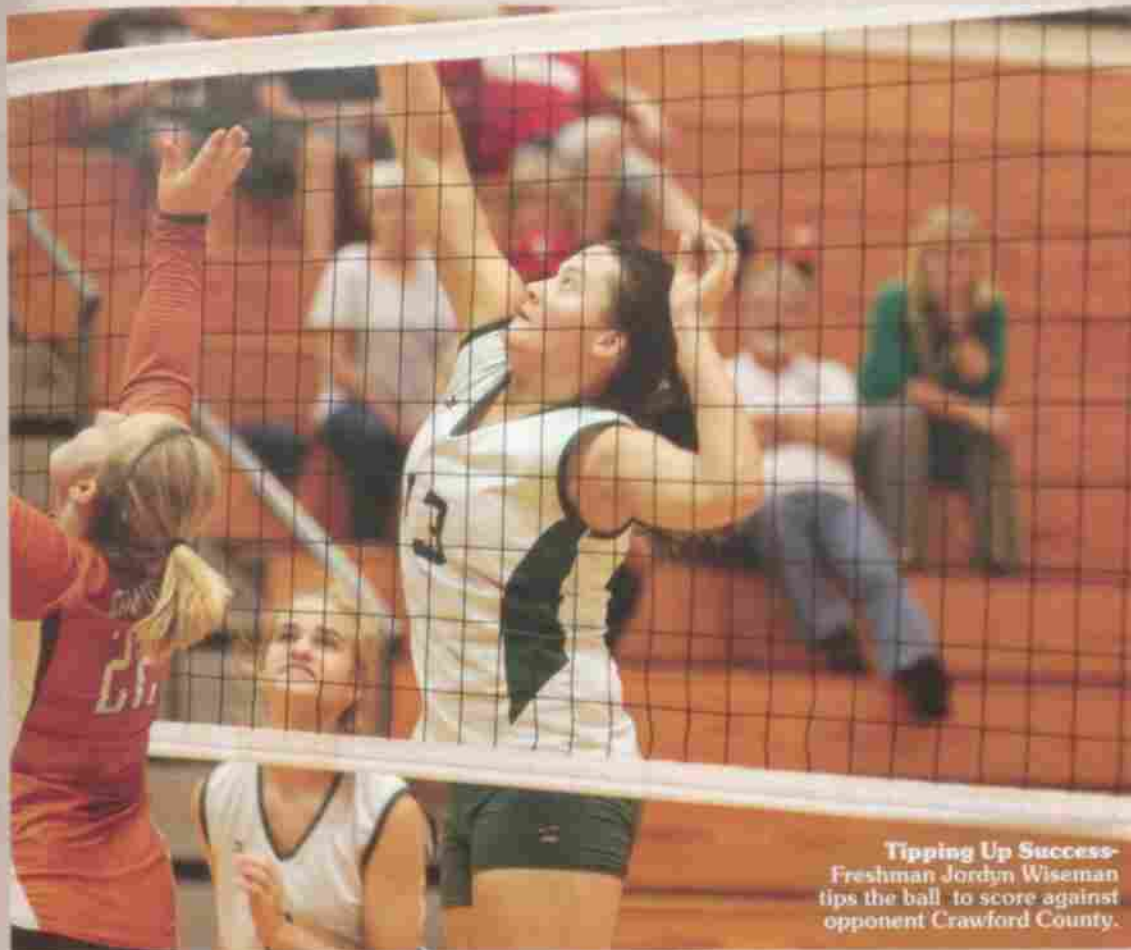

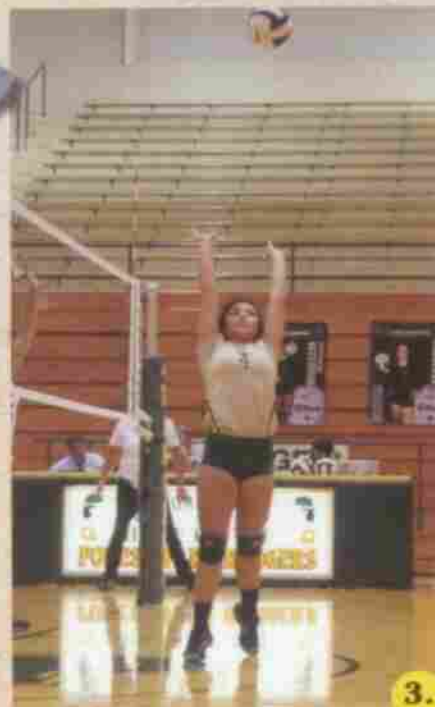

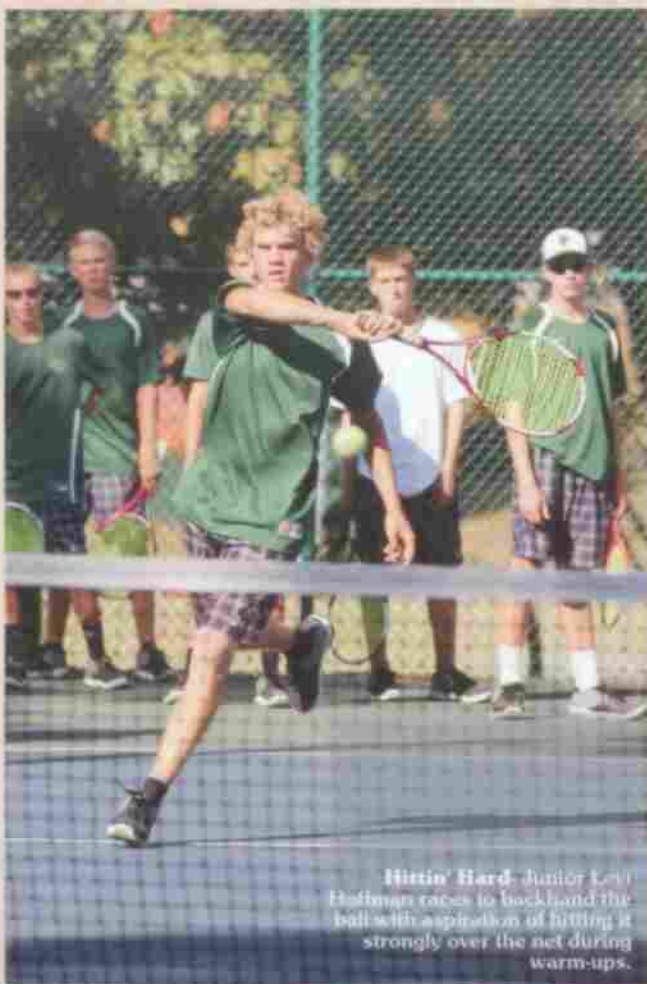
Ranger Boys Tennis Finish with a Swingin' Season

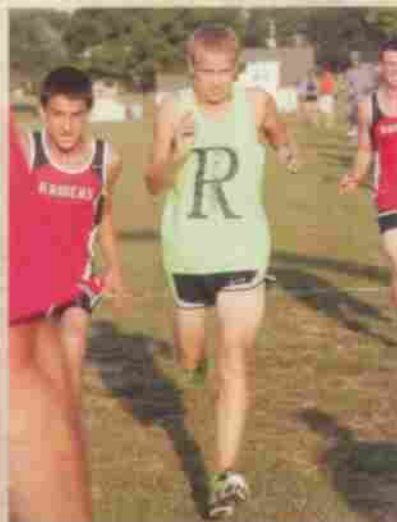

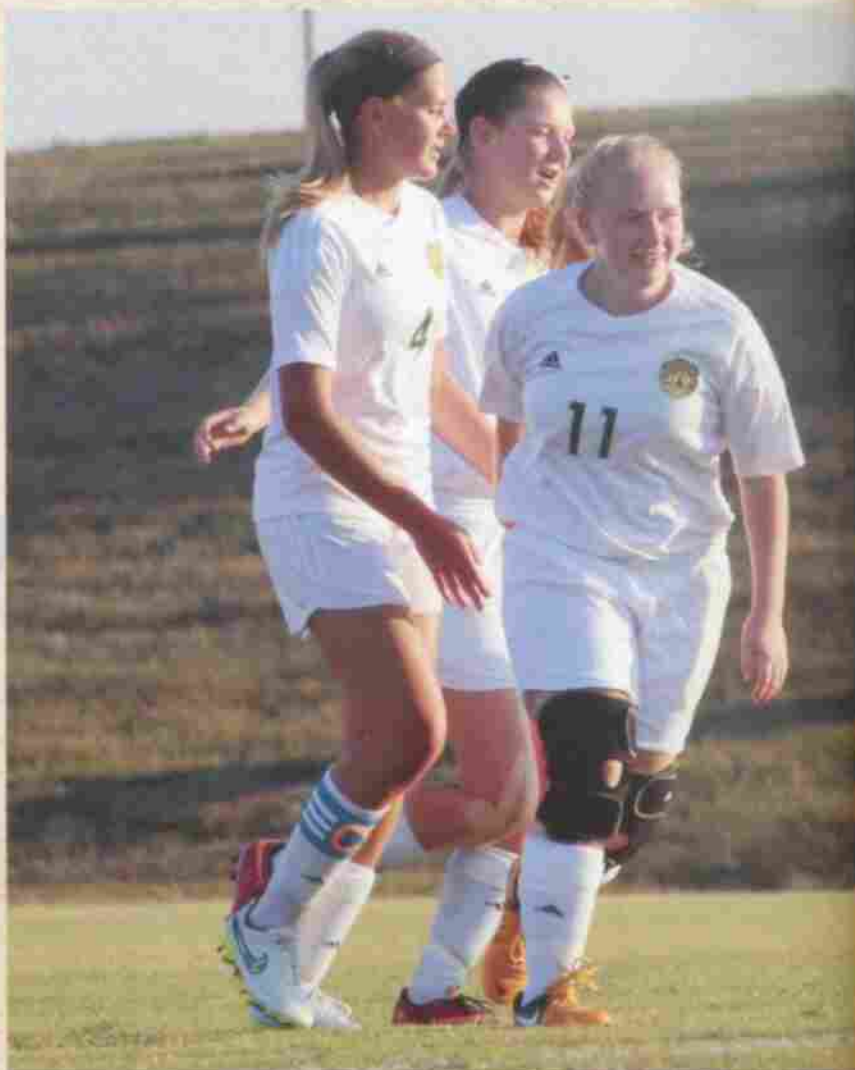
Small Team, Big Hearts

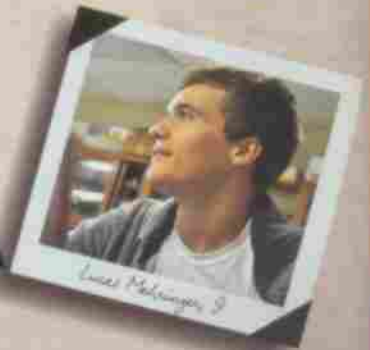
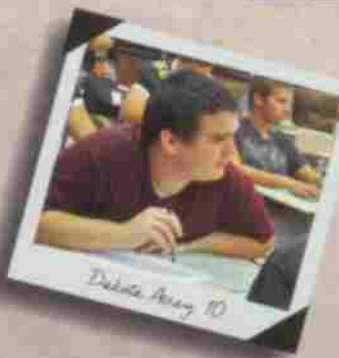

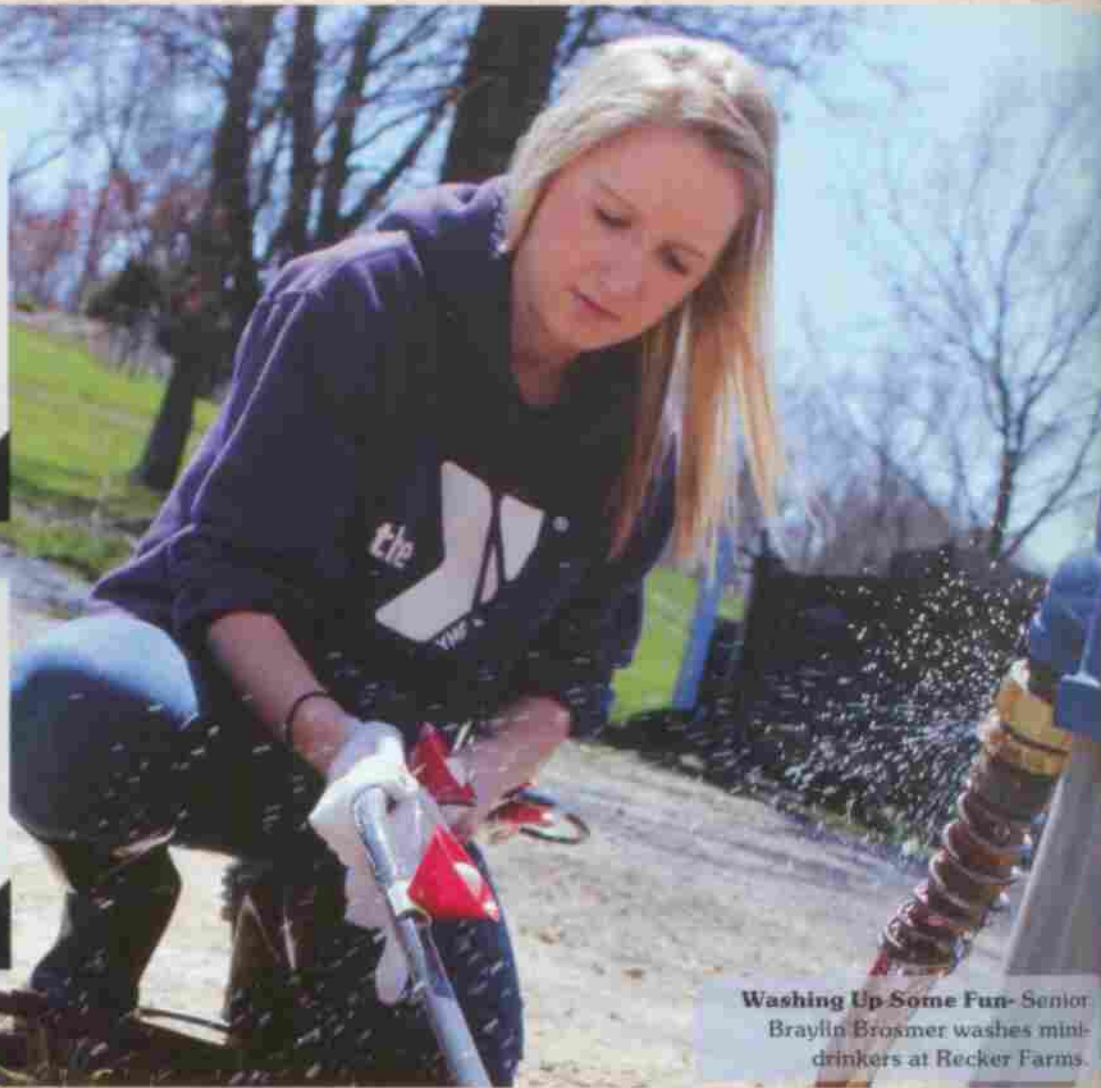

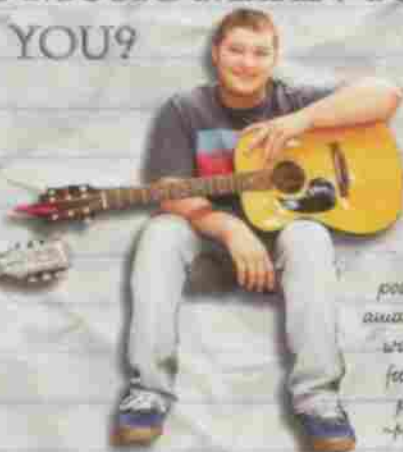

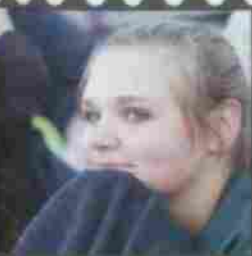

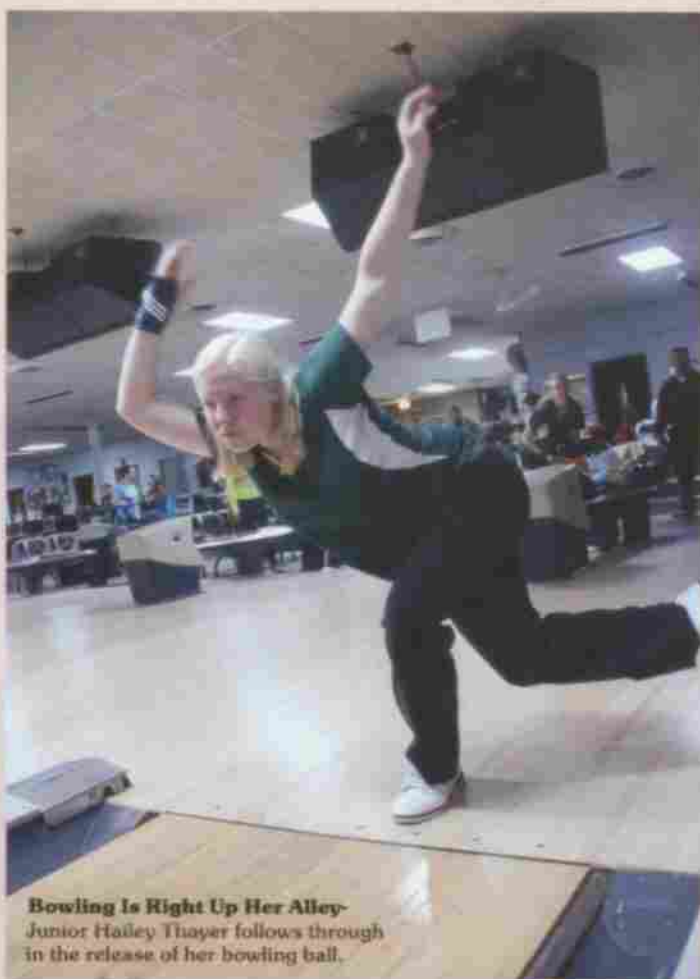

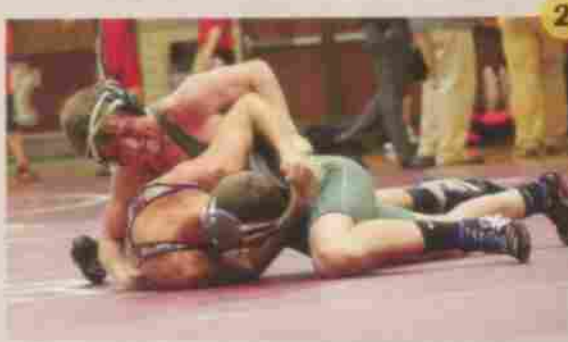

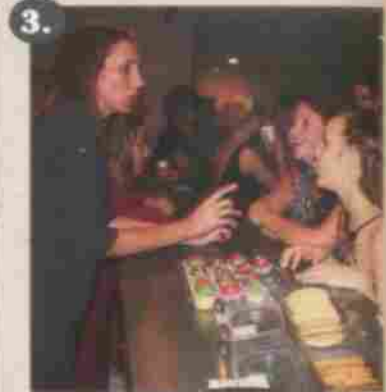

Autofocus on Agriculture Traits of the County

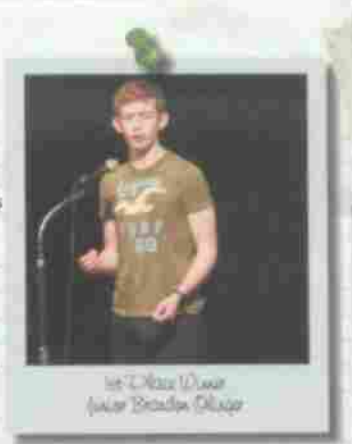

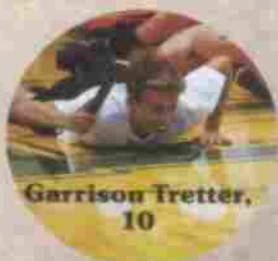

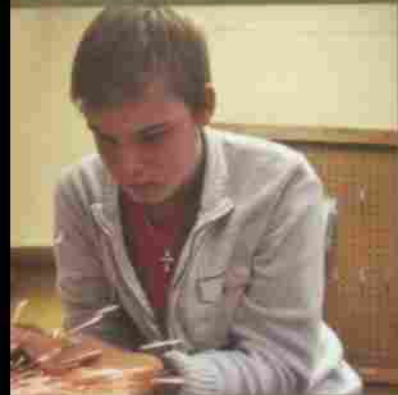

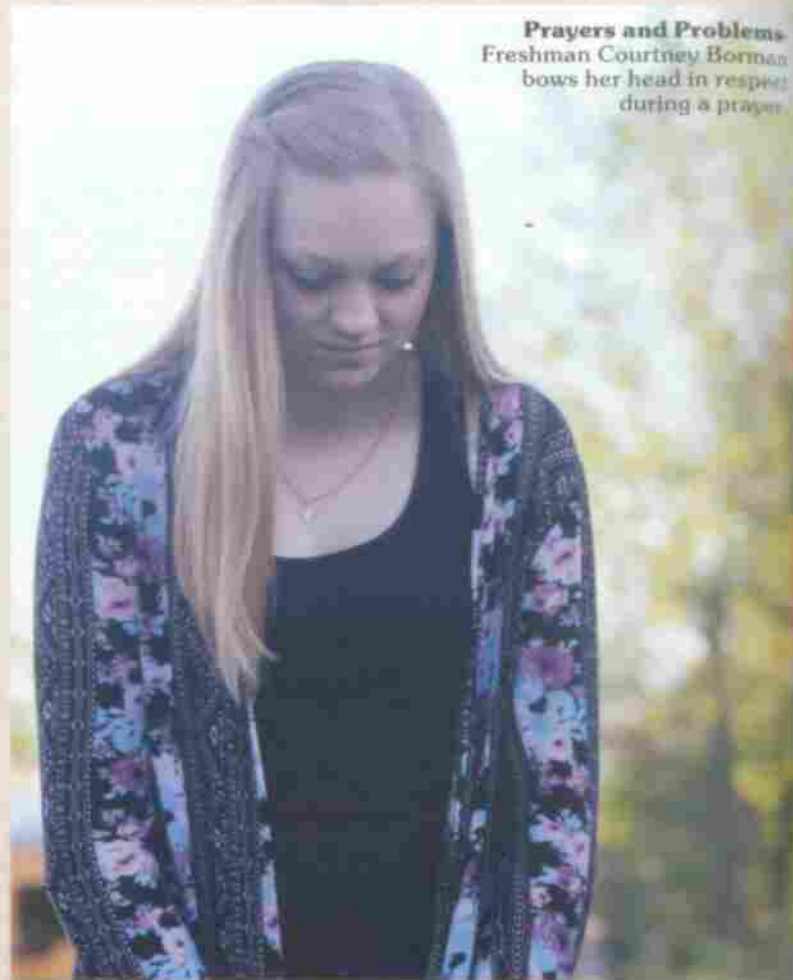

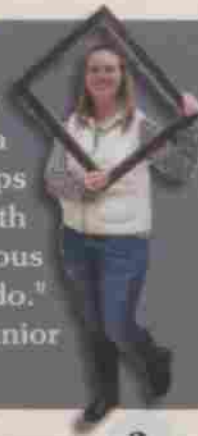

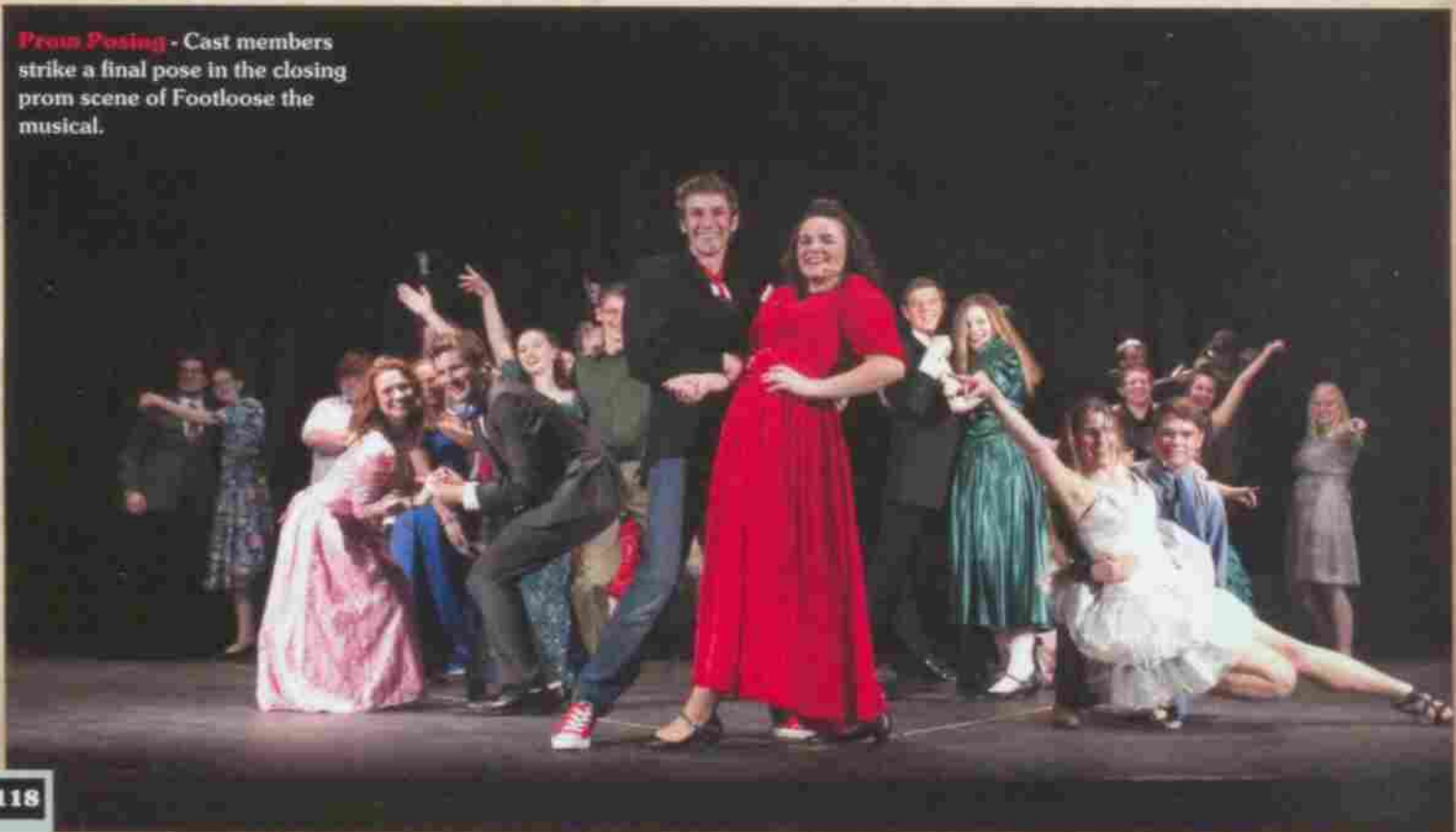


Cast Members Cut Loose

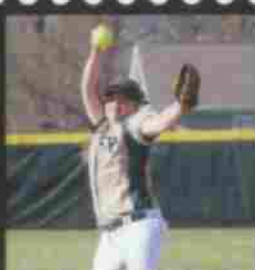

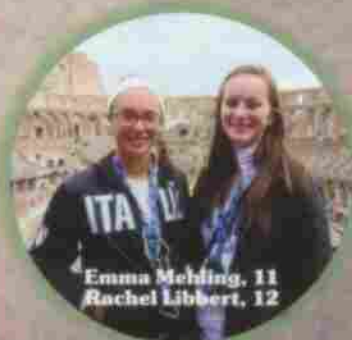

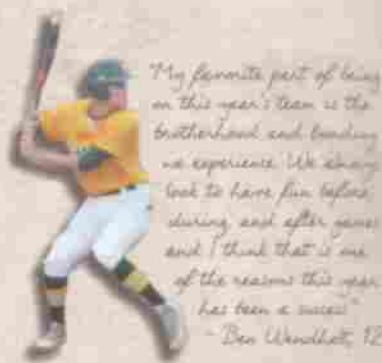

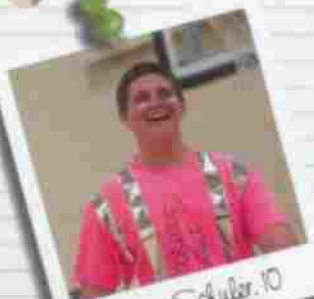

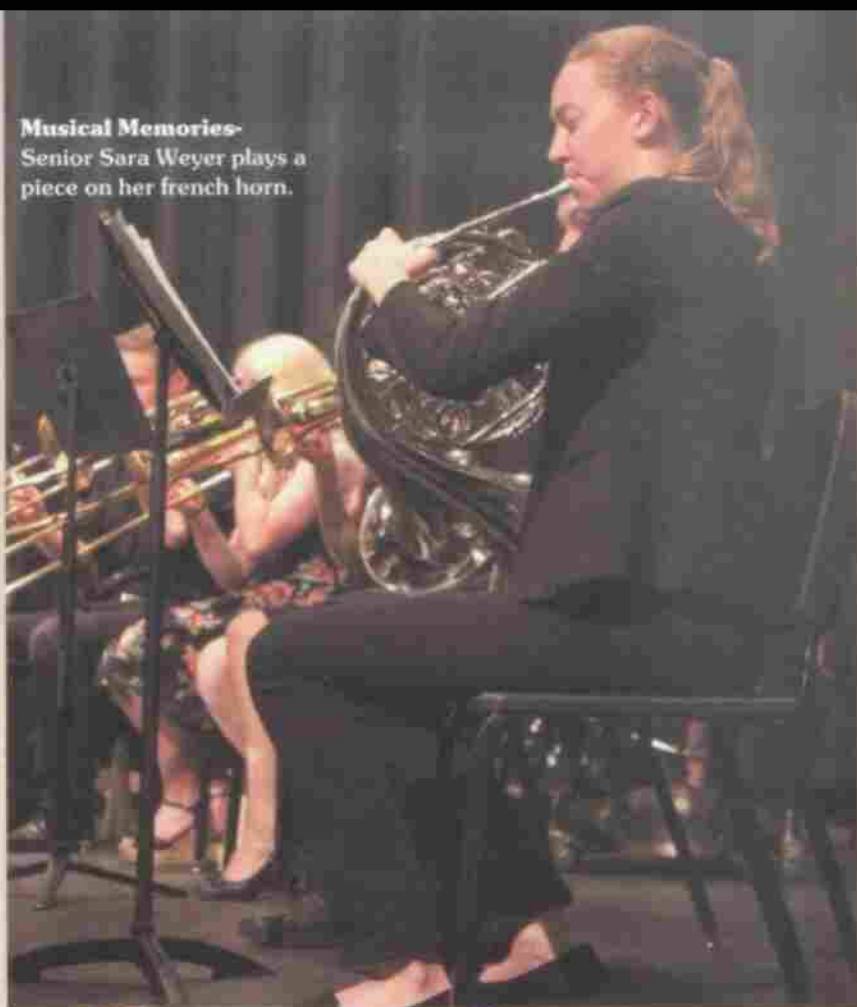

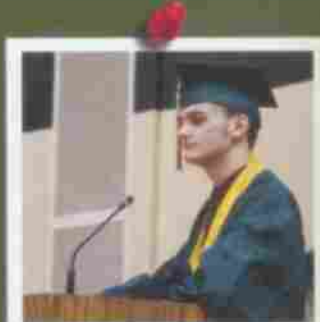

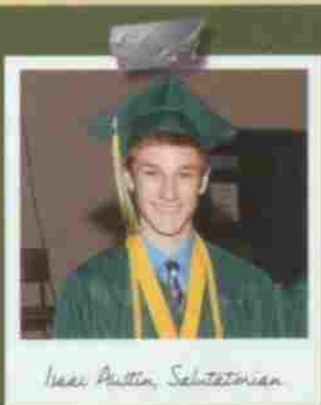
