



HONOR AWARDS

GW0-

In order for a student to be eligible for an honor award, an annual average of 90 per cent or more must be maintained in school citizenship, and a scholastic average of 90 per cent or more in four subjects, reciting five times per week.

The honor award for the first year is a gold chenille letter with the J for Jasper and S for scholar-ship. The student who is eligible for an honor award the second year will be awarded a bronze pin, with the word scholastic engraved, and with the school year. For the third year a silver pin is awarded and for maintaining the said standard for four years, the pupil is entitled to a gold pin, the highest award in scholarship which can be attained.


Early in the school year the Senior class under the leadership of Robert Schum started agitation for student government. To further this objective, a central committee, composed of members of the Senior Executive Council and representatives from all home rooms, was formed to devise plans for student government. Accordingly, a constitution for student government was drawn up, agreed to by the school authorities, and ratified by an overwhelming majority of the student body.

After the election of members to the Council—three members each from the Senior and Junior classes, two each from the Sophomore and Freshman classes, and one from the clubs—the first meeting of the Student Council was held on January 5. Officers were elected, and student government of Jasper High School was started on its career.

The Student Council immediately began to put student government into effect. Clubs, among which were the Debating Club, the Camera Club, and the Outdoor Club, were organized; a system of student monitors to regulate the traffic in the halls was put into effect; a number of study halls were placed on the honor system with students in charge; convocation period entertainments were given every two weeks by the respective classes. In general, student government in its first year at Jasper High School has been highly successful, and everyone connected with it has high hopes for the future.

The "J" feels that especial credit is due the council president, Robert Schum, without whose dream of student government for Jasper High School and without whose enthusiastic and untiring efforts to insure its adoption and success, the venture must have failed.

Student government is comparatively rare in the schools of southern Indiana, and Jasper High School may well be proud of the fine example it has set by making such a successful start in the direction of government by the students themselves. The future can hold only more success for such an efficient and worthy system.











The Jasper High School Debate Club was organized in October, 1937. It has twelve members.

In December the Debate Club joined the Indiana State Debate League. The Indiana 1937-38 question for debate was: Resolved, that Indiana should adopt a unicameral form of government. On February 9, the Jasper affirmative lost to the Reitz negative team of Evansville. A practice debate took place on February 10 between Jasper negative and Dale affirmative at Jasper. On February 16 the Reitz affirmative met and defeated the Jasper negative. In February the sectional debate of the Indiana State Debating League was held at Huntingburg, New Albany winning the tourney. The club staged its last debate for the Kiwanis Club, April 5.

The activities of the Debate Club in its first year, though not always successful, were enjoyable and educational, and this club proved to be one of the most active in Jasper High School.



SYLVIA

BAND AND ORCHESTRA

Two organizations have constituted the major musical influence of the school for the past two years—a band consisting of 52 members and an orchestra of 49. Each of these has appeared in various school functions.

In the past year the band and orchestra made numerous public appearances including those at: the annual Christmas program, the WLS Barn Dance, a concert in April, a Mother's Day program at Lincoln Park sponsored by the Boy Scouts of Southern Indiana, the Senior play and commencement. The band also played for all home basketball games.

Both groups were directed by Miss Schnaus, to whom belongs also the credit for their organization in 1936 and 1937, until her untimely death in February. Since then Mr. G. Virgil Gobba has very successfully taken over the leadership. Both the band and orchestra were entered in the district contest at Cannelton competing in class C. The orchestra was recommended for the State Contest at Lafayette, where it placed in second division. The band was placed in second division at the district meet.

The marching band consists of 30 members of the concert band with Miss Sylvia Fritch as drum major. At the district contest at Sullivan last year Miss Fritch was awarded a trophy for the best drum major.

A brass ensemble was started in 1938 and played at Cannelton receiving second prize.

ATHLETICS



The honors of the 1937-1938 Basketball Season were well upheld by Coach Woodrow Weir and his band of fighting Wildcats. The Coach, using a veteran team, amassed a total of twenty-three wins over five defeats. Included in its season record are the Old Post Tourney, which the 'Cats captured New Year's day at Vincennes, and the Sectional crown eliminating the people's choice, H'burg. The team, in comparison with teams of former years, had superior height, weight, and stamina. The 'Cats had the grand total of 978 points scored as to the opponents' 740.

Senior members of the team included:

BERNARD HOFFMAN, valuable high-scoring forward, who, for the last two years was the highest individual scorer of the team, scoring well over 200 points. He was nominated as a member of the Tri-State Team.

LINUS PARKER, southpaw forward, not just an overwhelming scoring threat, but matching this by his great defensive and bankboard play.

URBAN VOEGERL, one of the greatest two-hand artists ever to perform for Jasper High. His fight will long be remembered.

ODES KING, not a regular, but when summoned to duty, proving that a substitute was as valuable as a regular.

MAURI GUTGSELL, offensive and defensive threat to all opposition, an important cog in the successful machine.

JACK GREWE, who performed in consistent style until sickness forced him to withdraw.

ATHLETICS

BASEBALL .

This season Jasper High School's baseball team under the tutelage of Woodrow Weir has won 9 games and lost 1. For the past three years Jasper has been a member of the Pocket Athletic Conference, consisting of Tell City, Huntingburg, Cannelton, Boonville, and Jasper. For two years the 'Cats were a strong contender for the crown but failed to acpture it. The 1938 scason was very successful, the team winning the league title. Their strength has been revealed in each department—pitching, hitting, and fielding. The pitching burden fell on Freshman Roman Pfeffer, Sophomore Tom Tucker, and Senior Mauri Gutgsell, all pitching above par for High School baseball. Urbin "Nigg" Pfeffer was the man in the clean-up spot, clouding all offerings handed to him by opposing pitchers. In fielding, the team worked like a clock, with very few errors being committed.
