Class History

Some people contend that sophomores are inconspicuous members of the student body but we beg to differ, for when we were sophs our record in band, orchestra, athletics and club activities was a very reputable one.

The glorious feeling of being placed in the upper-berth was ours the following year, for we were at last upper classmen—jolly Juniors—recognizable anywhere by the green and white jackets which we ordered in the fall.

Robert Gramelspacher again headed the class, with Maurice Kuper, as vice, and what's more—Ardella Birkle was again elected secretary and treasurer.

The most eagerly anticipated event of the year was the Junior-Senior reception at which we were host. To secure funds for this occasion we sold soft drinks to the fans who were admiring our basketball aspirants, George Lukemeyer, Ed Rumbach, and Bud Salb.

Our dream has been accomplished; in 1942 we are on the top—at last we're Seniors and proud of our large membership of 68 and of our beautiful class rings.

"Third-term" Gramelspacher was elected president with Margie Miller as vice, Ed Rumbach treasurer, and Ardella Birkle, secretary.

We really felt the pangs of "Senioritus" for the first time at the College Conference when we realized that we were practically "out now in the wicked world." And the sensation grows more acute as we look forward to the Junior-Senior Prom this time in OUR honor and with a mixture of pride and regret, to that solemn cap and gowned processional which will terminate our happy school days.

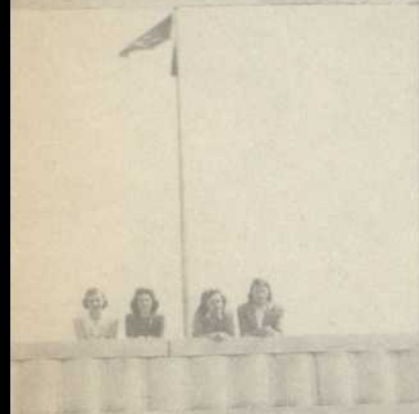

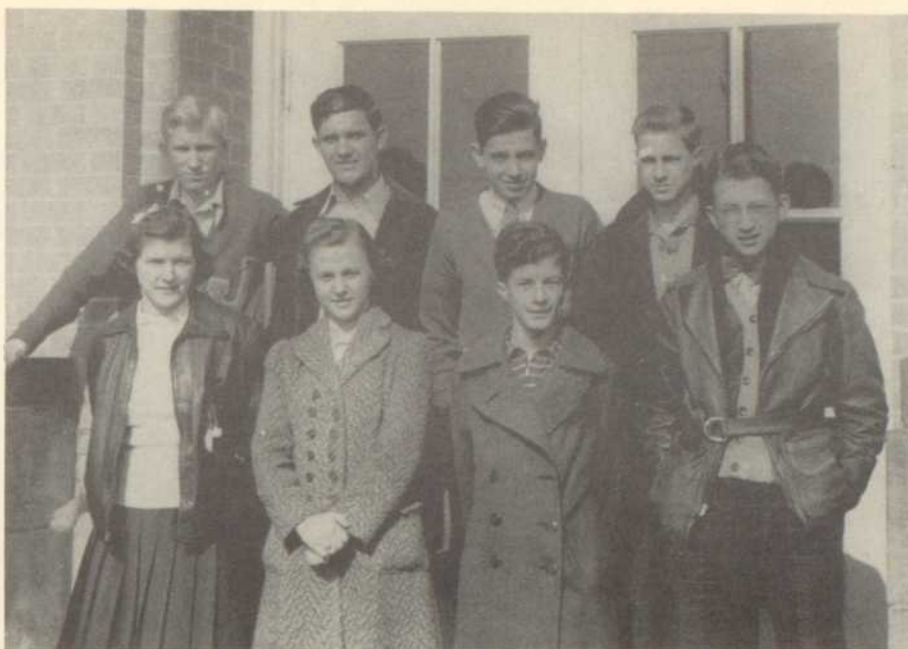

The spirit of patriotism hit Jasper High School when an election was held on January 13 for the choosing of a Defense Council.

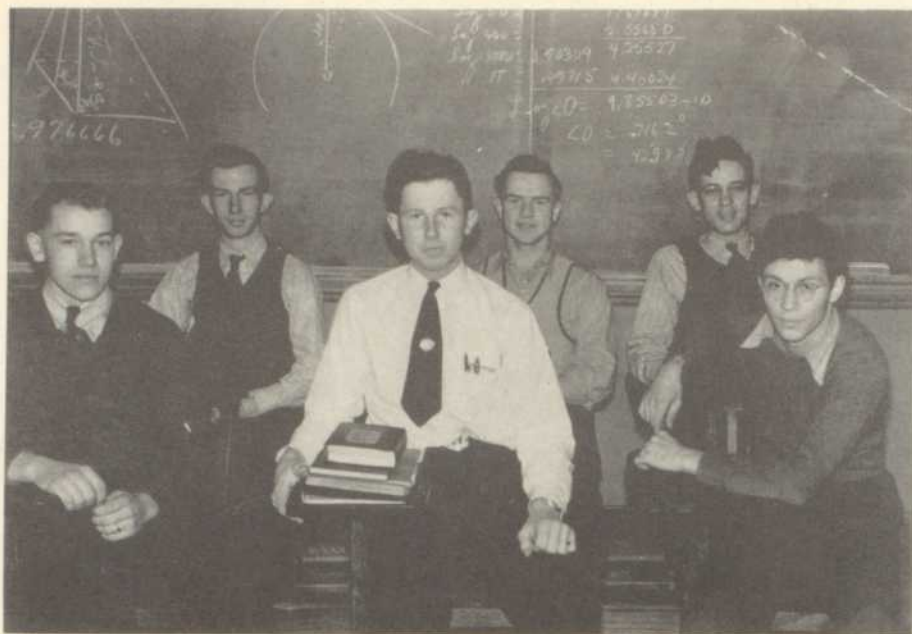
Separate votings were carried on in each of the home rooms. Results of these made a council composed of two members from each class.

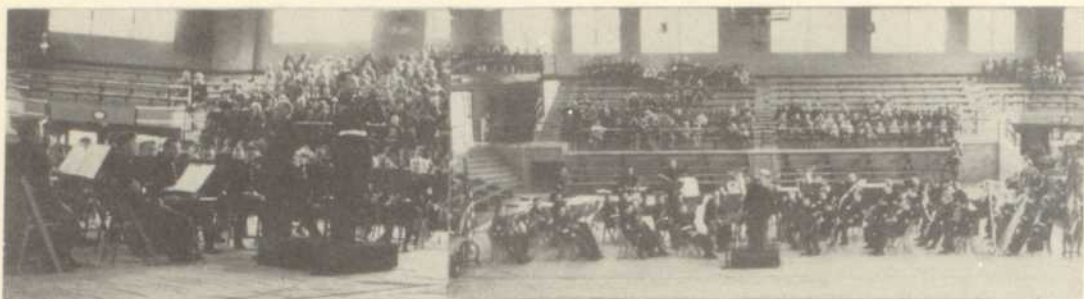

Cabby's Crew In '42'

Jasper is proud of its Wildcats of '42. They brought the "little brown jug" back home once again. They brought Jasper its first sectional championship team since 1938. They also advanced further in the Great Elimination than any other J. H. S. team since 1934.

The Wildcats, as they strode onto the hardwood on November the 7th last year, were one big question mark in the minds of local fans. The fans were sure of this only; the 'Cats were a big, coarse, but scrapping crew. All hopes for a rosy future were shattered in the New Year's Day Tournament when the 'Cats suffered two humiliating defeats. Improving, however, with each game the 'Cats developed into a big, smooth, fast, and hard hitting aggregation. The fans were awakened to their possibilities when, on the night of February 5, they conquered the previously undefeated Central Bears by nine points. This started the whispering of "Cabby's due in '42." The 'Cats finished the regular scheduled season with nine consecutive victories tucked under their belt. This augmented the whisper to a cry. The sectional triumphs increased the cry to a roar. Spirit and enthusiasm was high as the 'Cats journeyed to Washington for the regional. They captured the first tilt in a hard fought game from a vastly improved pack of Bicknell Bulldogs. That night in the final game of the regional, the state champion Washington Hatchets ended Jasper's victory string at fourteen consecutive games, but not without competition of near state caliber. The scoreboard read, after 32 torrid and thrill packed minutes, Washington 27 Jasper 24. This drew to a close the 1941-42 season for the Wildcats.

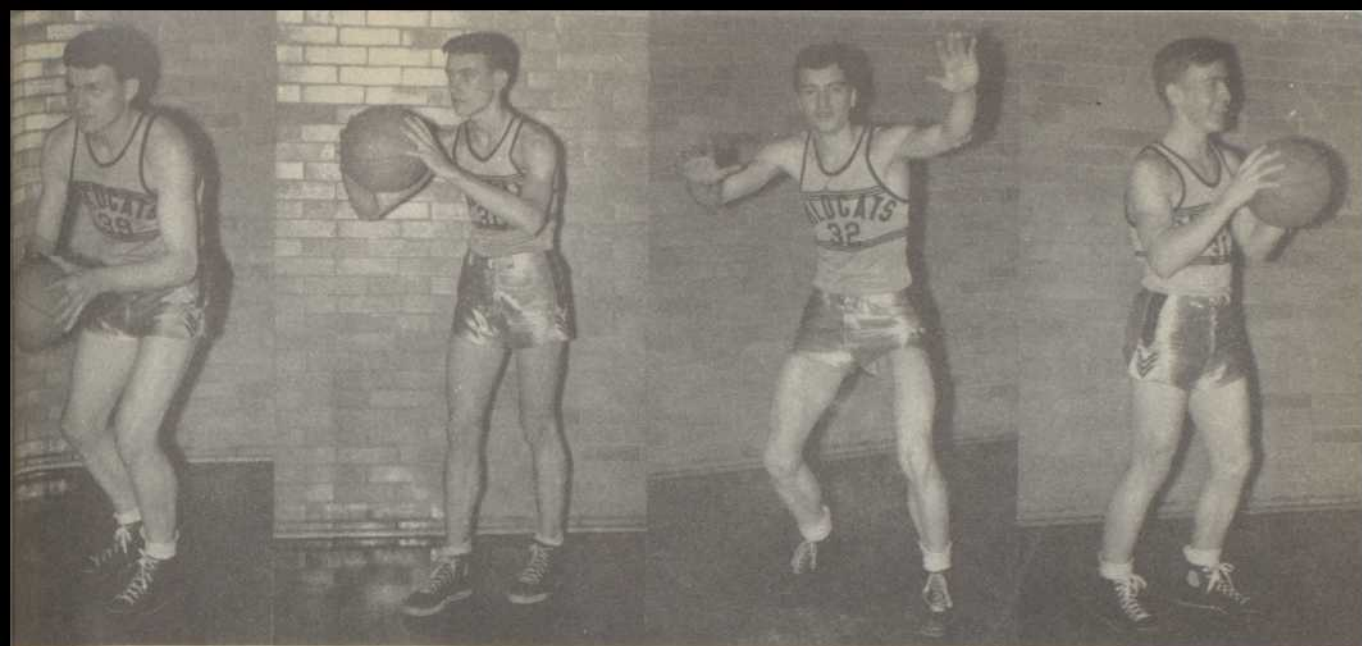

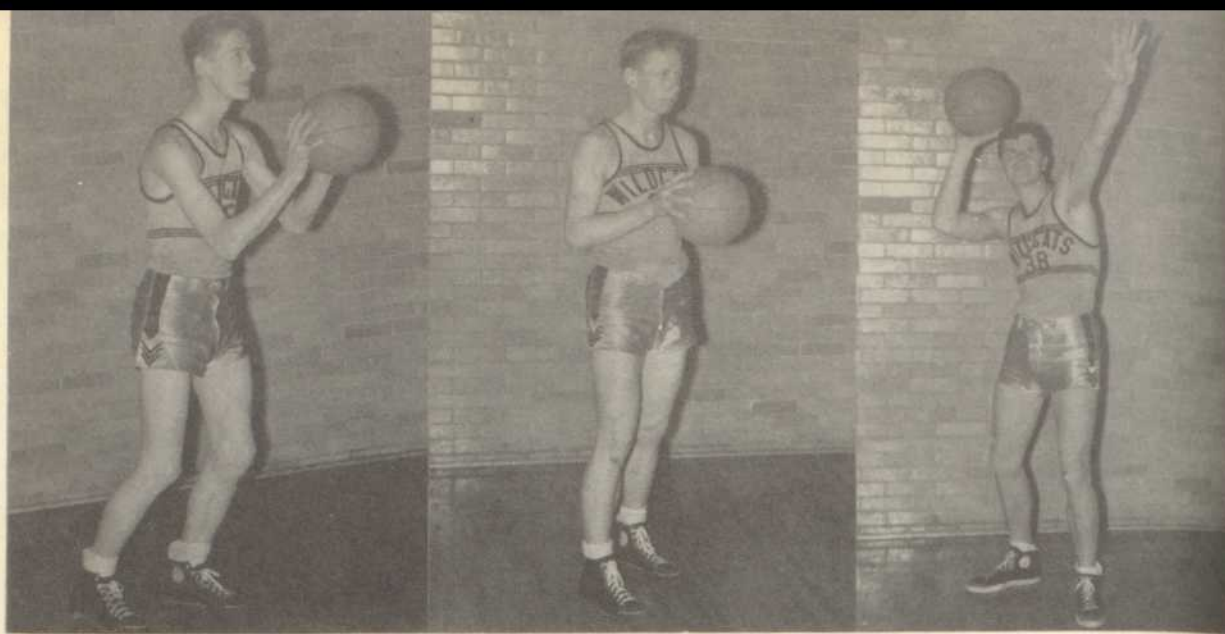

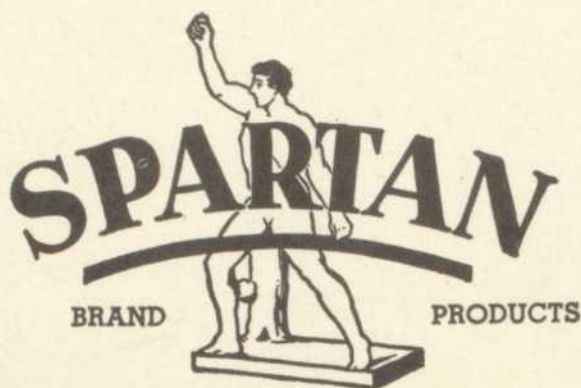
