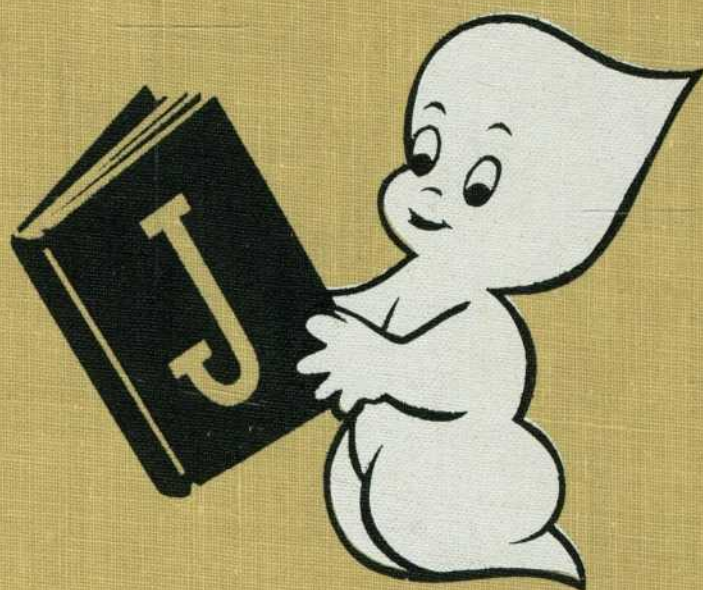
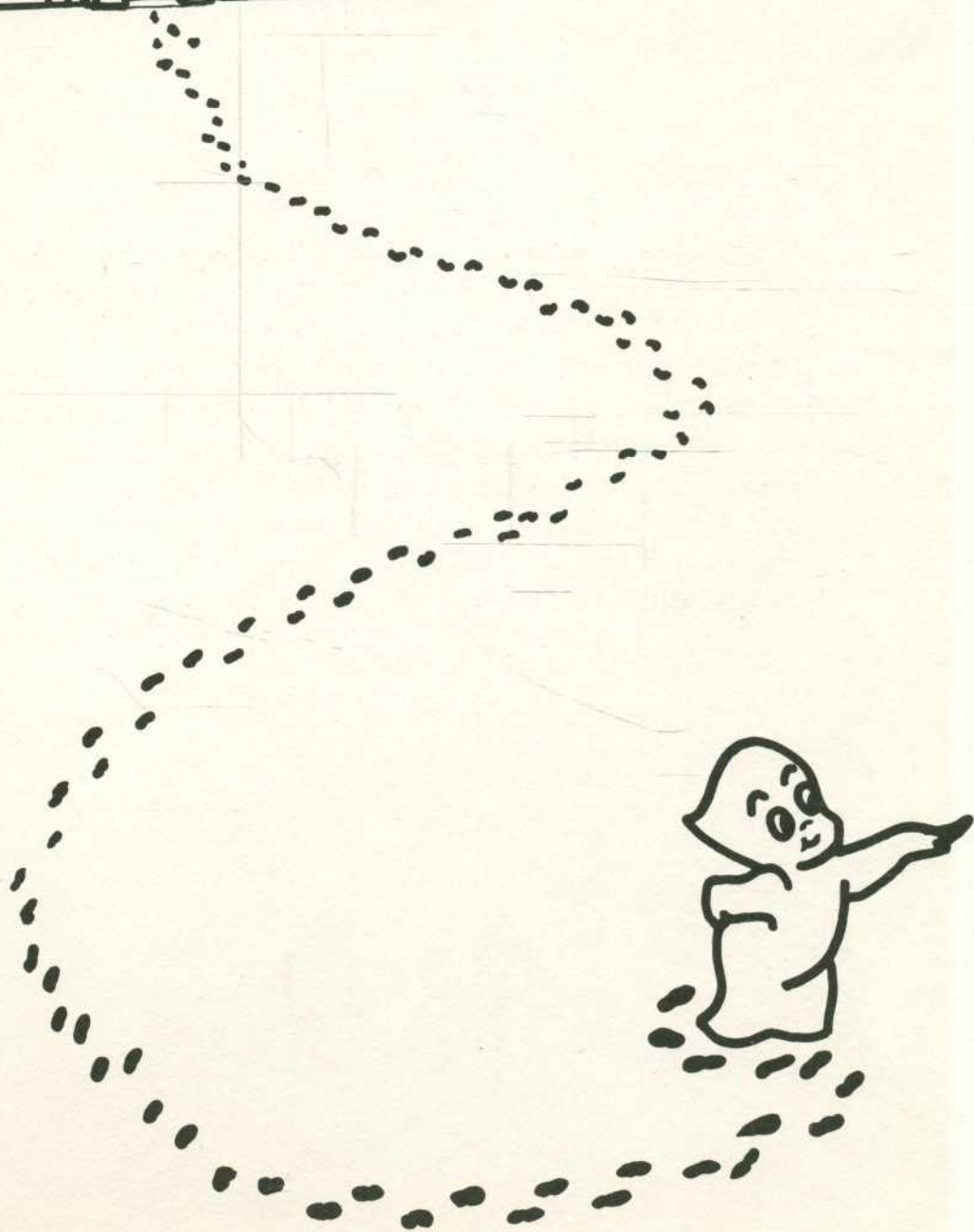
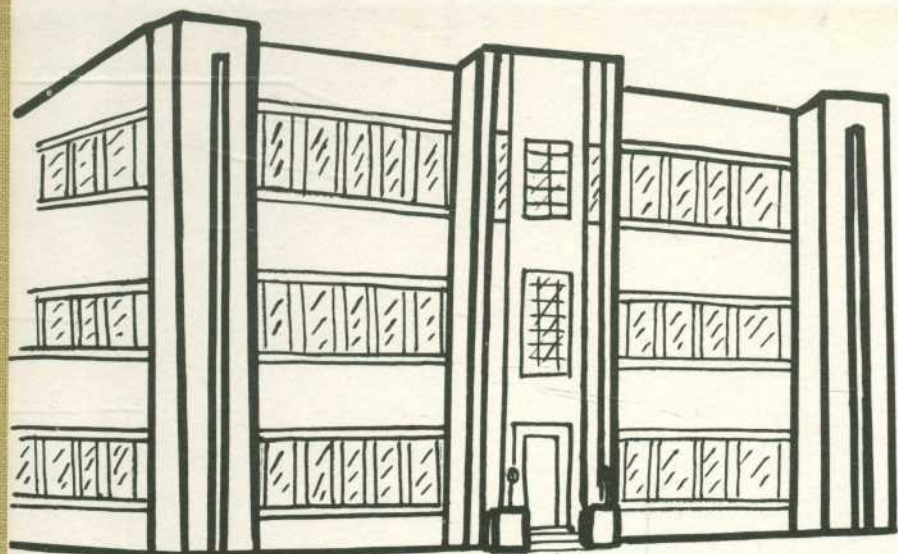

Seniors who know the ropes now were scared little freshmen once even if they don't want to admit it. They climbed the steps very slowly and deliberately and observed every move that the upperclassmen made, dreaming of the day that they could do the same. Yes, now those same students are ready to face the world and make use of all the skills they learned in high school. But the same cycle revolves; and now there is another group of green freshmen awaiting the day that they, too, will march to the strains of POMP AND CIRCUMSTANCE.

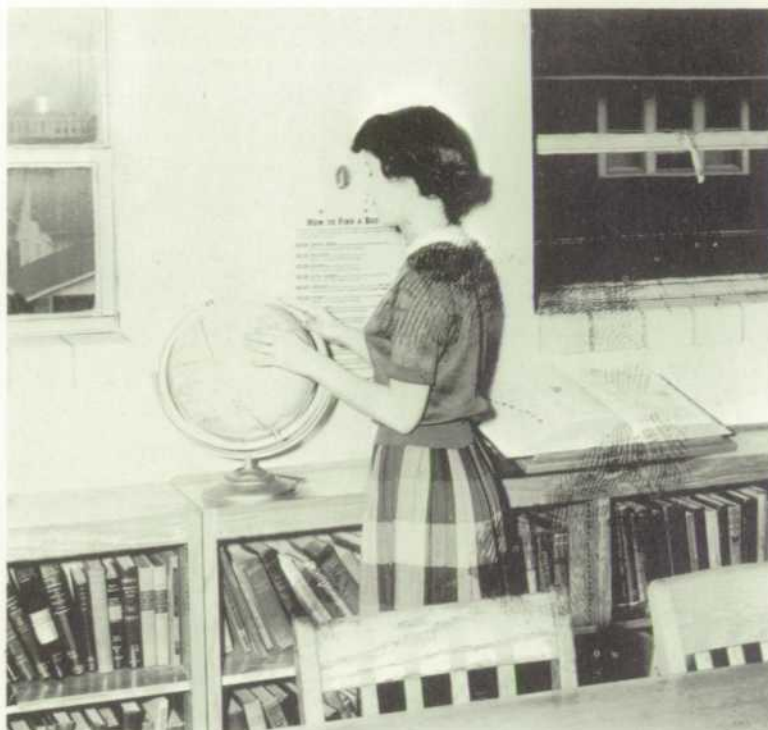
Besides reading of the history of the world, Mr. Fierst's classes made models of the things they were studying, for example soap castles.



Student librarian Joan Fischer operates the new ditto machine in the library to run off some tests to be used in Mr. Renneisen's literature classes this term.

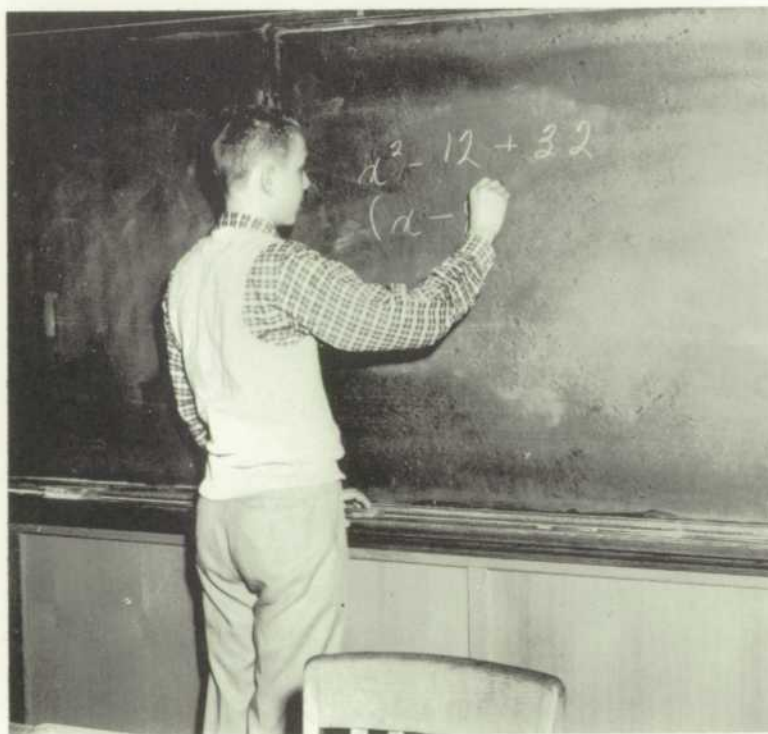

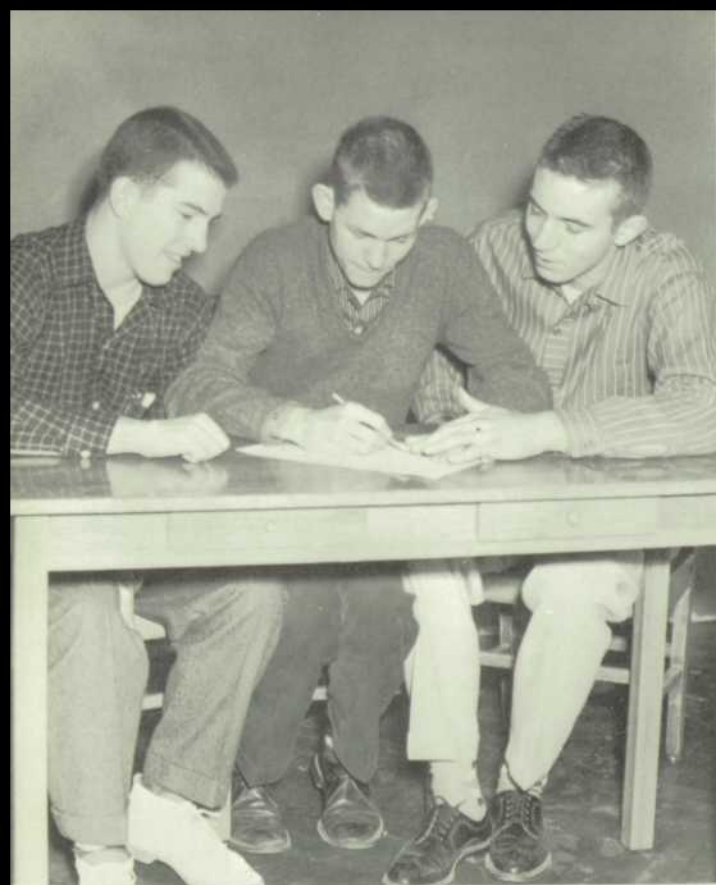

CATS HAVE GREAT SEASON

Coach Tom Stokes in his second year as JHS football coach guided the Wildcats to another outstanding record as they downed six opponents while losing only two games by very narrow margins.

The Cats scored 175 points to their opponents 100 points as they defeated Mitchell 35-13, Tell City 7-6, Washington 33-13, Huntingburg 20-13, Providence 25-7, and Bicknell 37-14, while losing only to Bedford 12-20, and to Princeton 6-14.

For the year the Wildcats piled up one hundred three first downs to their opponent's fifty-eight. They outgained their opponents rushing by 549 yards with a total of 1729 yards to 1180 yards. The Cats completed forty of ninety-three passes and had seven intercepted while their opponents completed only fourteen of forty-four and had three intercepted. The Cats outgained the opposition in passing yardage by a wide margin, 558 yards to 145 yards.

The Wildcats fumbled twenty times and recovered seven of their own fumbles and sixteen of their opponents fumbles. The opposition fumbled twenty-five times, recovering nine of their own fumbles and thirteen Jasper fumbles. Total yards penalized for the season were about equal with 390 for Jasper to 370 for the opposition.

Ten different players participated in the Jasper scoring this season with fullback Denny Otto and halfback Joe Rohleder leading with 37 and 36 points respectively. Halfback Jim Lehmkuhler was close behind with 30 points followed by Bohnert with 21, Detroy with 12, Giesler with 12, Sheffield with 12, Friedman with 6, Wagner with 6, and Brames with 3.

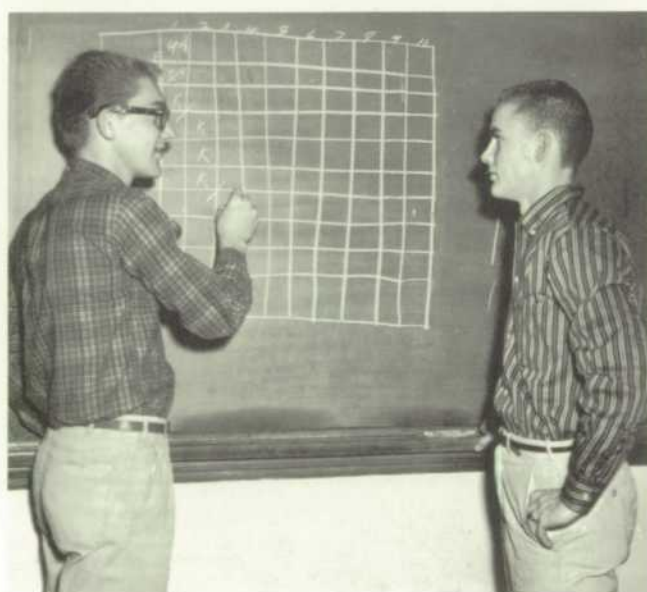

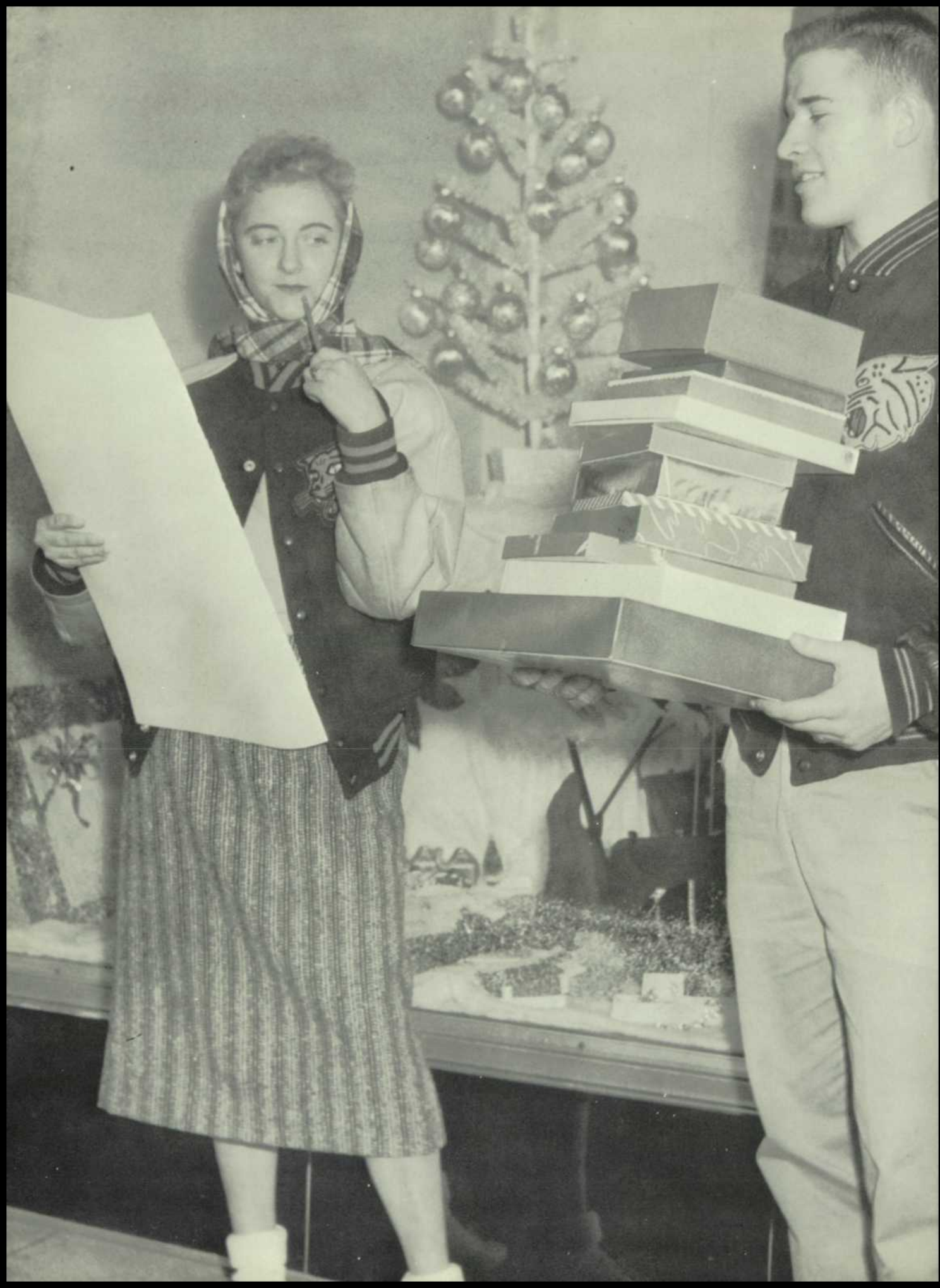

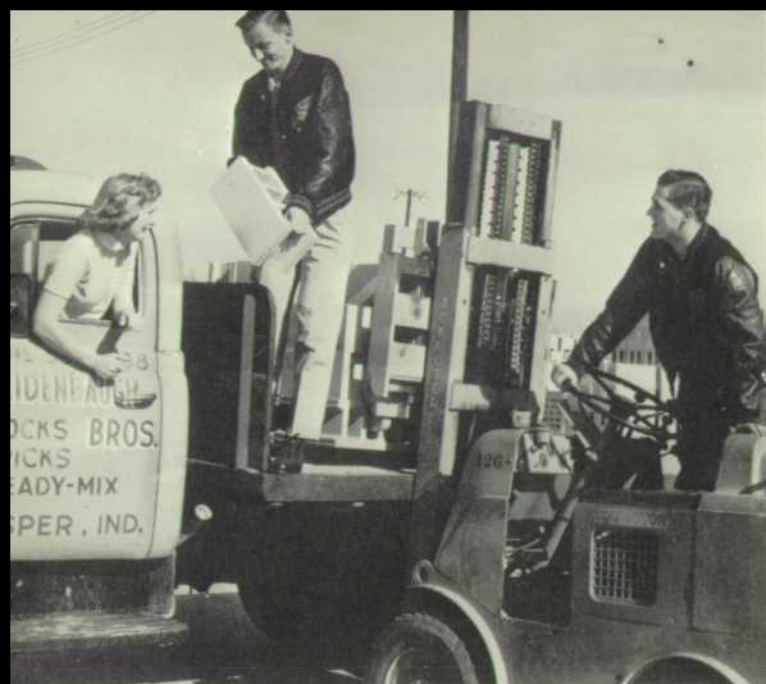
