

There is a course of study for every taste and ability at JHS. Each student has an opportunity to select the subjects in which he is interested and which he will need to help him to choose a future career.


The students who are planning to further their education at some college or university usually follow the academic course. These students take subjects such as English Composition, Latin, chemistry, geometry, and other college

prep courses.

Those who wish a commercial course may choose from such subjects as typing, shorthand, bookkeeping, business law, office practice, and consumer science. Students on the commercial course generally have a secreterial vocation in mind.

The vocational course is offered for those who are decided on the life occupation they want to pursue.

If a student is undecided about the future, his best bet is to follow the general course. In this branch of study you can choose any combination of subjects, with only English, history, math and biology required.


Mr. Zehr, Mr. wuchner, and Mr. Hollinden are the very capable math teachers at JHS.

LANGUAGE DEPARTMENT

Miss Margaret Hochgesang and Mr. Jerry Brewer head the physical education department at Jasper High School.







Miss Shirley Kaiser and Mrs. Gladys Mallett are the home economics teachers at JHS.




Students in a geography class observe the location of different hemispheres.



This marks the start of the IHSAA Sectional Meet held at Jasper this year.









Coach Brewer takes time out to give Mick Stenftenagel a few pointers on the next play and the opponents' defense.

VARSITY FOOTBALL

The Wildcats stalwart defensive unit, noted all year for its fine performances, held their 1960 apposition to 121 points. The defensive attack was led by tackles Jim Thyen and Dave Eckerle, and guards Amie Brames and Jim Gugtsel, with Vic Hurm, Errol Howe, Gary Jahn, Steve Heidorn, and Bill Jahn supplying that added punch.

The hard-running Wildcat offense, behind some terrific front-line block-ing, scored a record 281 points with Norb Krapf, Jerry Rees, Jim Lindsay, Jack McCune, Mike Steftenagel, Jim Rohleder, John Huelsman, and Jerry Schmidt gaining most of the yardage.





The 1960 Wildcats, under the guidance of Coach Jerry Brewer, shattered two school scoring records on their way to posting a remarkable 6-2-1 season record.


After two long hard weeks on the practice field, the Wildcat squad opened their successful campaign by massacring their new gridiron foes, the North Posey Vikings, 59-12 in what was to be their first new scoring record of the season.

In the second game of the season the top ranked Bedford Stonecutters broke open a tense, hard fought struggle in the last four minutes of play to give the hard fighting Wildcats their initial loss of the season 26-12.

VARSITY FOOTBALL

Bedford was just the first of six SIAC Conference foes the Wildcats faced this season.

Leading the Tell City Marksmen by a score of 13-6 at halftime, the Wildcats saw the Marksmen come back strong to tie the score in the third period of play. Sensational goal line stands by the Wildcats halted the Marksmen four times inside Jasper's 10-yard line in the last period of play. Both teams fought to a standstill but neither team was able to score on the mud-soaked field during the remainder of the game, and it ended in a 13-13 tie.





The Washington Hatchets, ruled as pre-game favorites, were upset by the aggressive Wildcats the following week. The Wildcats virtually dominated the entire game and ended up beating the Hatchets 34-6.

Possession of the traveling grid trophy "The Goal Posts" was insured when the Wildcats trounced their arch rivals, the Huntingburg Happy Hunters, by a lopsided score of 60-6. The Wildcats exploded with a record-shattering performance of 60 points to set a new single game scoring record for a JHS football team.

Jasper squeezed out a 13-12 victory in a hard fought battle against Salem in one of the most exciting games of the year.


VARSITY FOOTBALL

Coach Jerry Brewer's Jasper Wildcats downed the Mitchell Bluejackets 28-6 and in doing so set a new season scoring record of 221 points with two games remaining to be played.

A four game winning streak by Jasper was snapped as the Princeton Tigers continued to maintain their hex over the Wildcats. Capitalizing on several Wildcat fumbles, the Tigers won their fifth straight SIAC game 33-12.

Jasper capped a successful football campaign by smashing the Bicknell Bulldogs in a 48-7 rout.




ACTIVITIES






BASKETBALL QUEEN

Coach Barney Scott led his 1960-61 Jasper Wildcats to a brilliant season, whose close found them playing for the Semi-State crown.

Sparked by the return of four regulars, Bob Merder, Bob Kreilein, Jerry Rees, and Mick Stenftenagel, the Wildcats posted a remarkable 15-5 regular season record before advancing to the finals of the Semi-State.

Jasper finished second only to topranked Evansville North in the SIAC Conference race and won their second Lafayette Holiday Tourney by downing LaPorte 59-49 in the final game. Pos-session of the "Little Brown Jug" was also insured until next season as JHS gained sweet revenge for one of their early season losses at the hands of Huntingburg by trouncing them 76-45. Team effort, hustle, determination

and aggressiveness brought Jasper to the final game of the Huntingburg Sectional, where they downed the Winslow Eskimos 85-58 after smashing archrival Huntingburg 68-57.

The following week found the Wildcats in hot contention for the regional championship. After beating the Loogoo-tee Lions 50-46 in the afternoon, the Cats succeeded in edging past Monroe City 76-75 for the regional title.

And then there were eight as the Jasper Wildcats downed Corydon 86-65 and advanced to the title game to vie for the semi-state crown. Competition was fast and furious in the final game which found the Wildcats battling the Tell City Marksmen to a 29-26 halftime advantage. Things didn't go too well for JHS in the second half though, and the final score found Jasper behind 64-60.

Jasper set new school, tourney, and gym records by trouncing Springs Valley 97-60 in the march for their 17th sectional championship. High scoring Bob Merder was selected to play on the 1961 Indiana All Stars, and Bob Kreilein was chosen for his all around play to the South All Star team.







When there is work to be done, you can be sure the Student Council will get the job done.











Two members of the Quill and Scroll Society, Lou Borho and Gail Sermersheim were presented with medals for their outstanding work on publications at Jasper High School.


