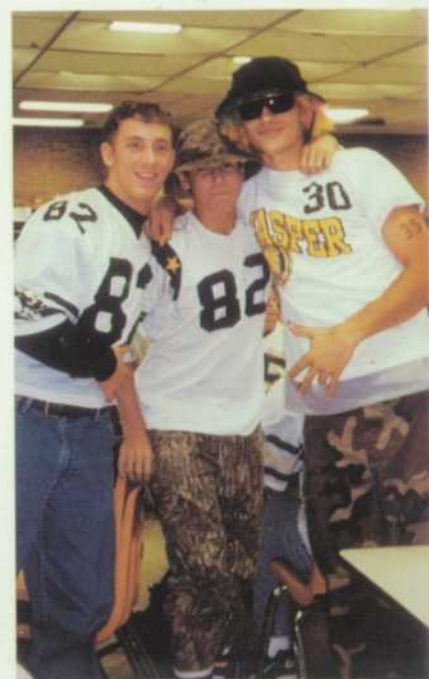
ARE YOU READY FOR?

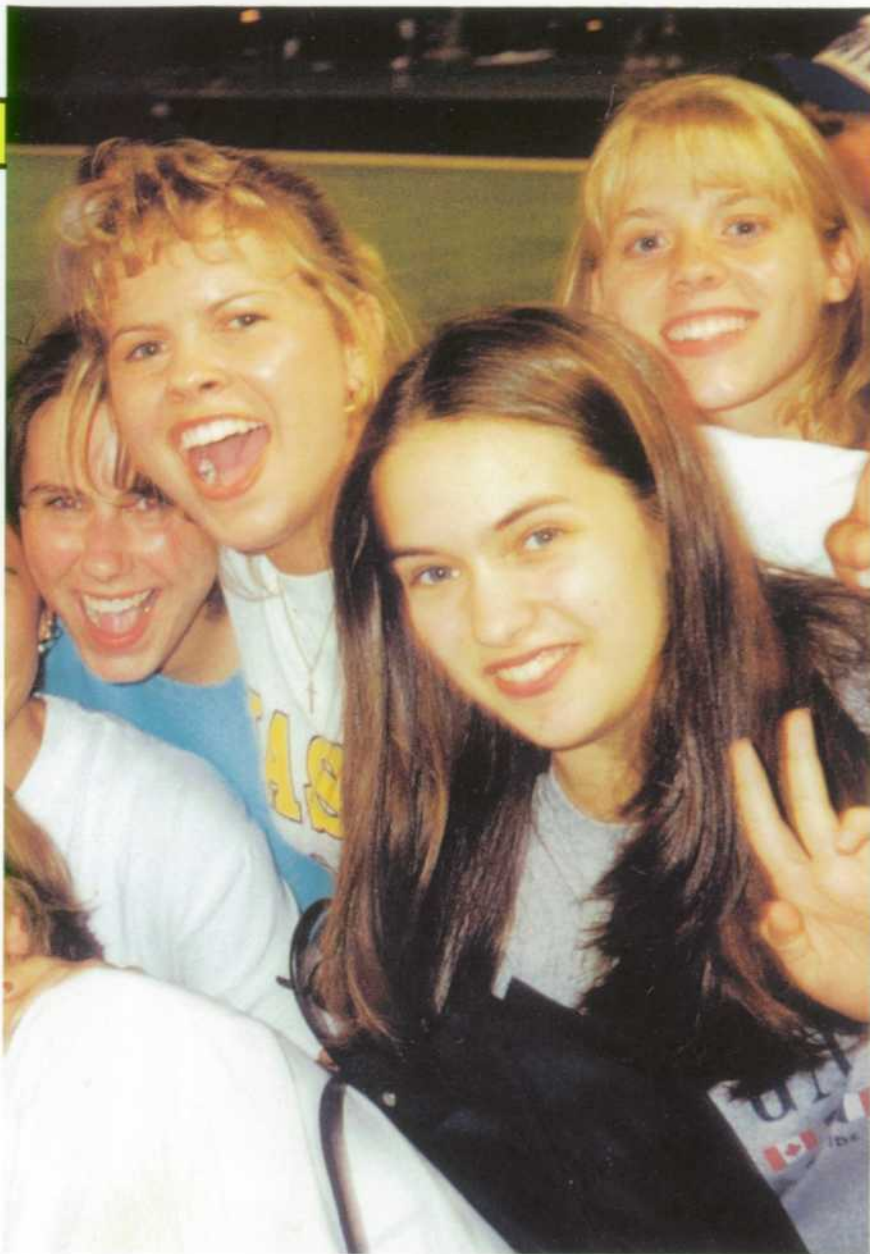

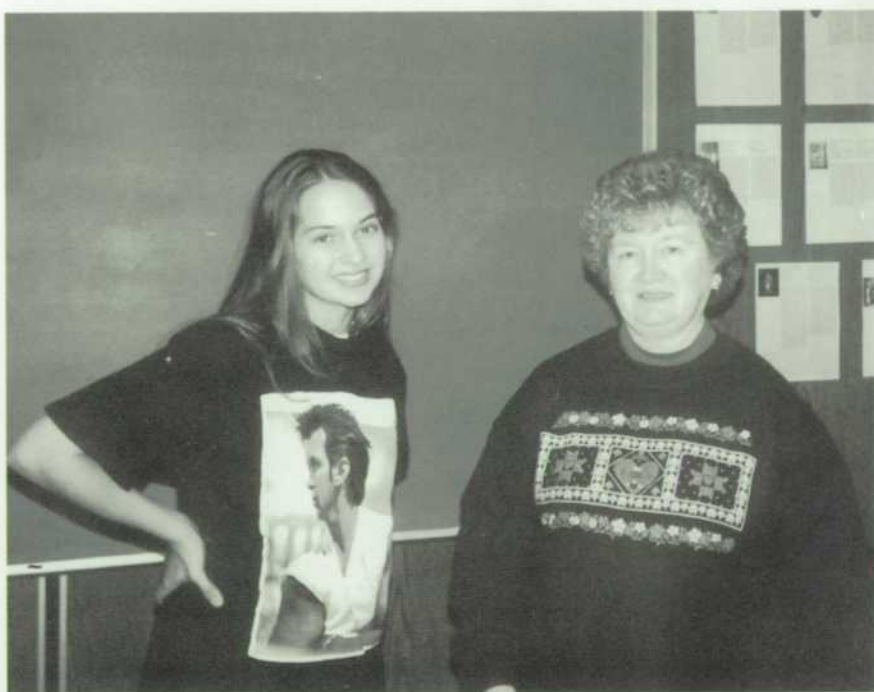
Eventually, both the students and the teachers learned to exploit the advantages of having family members at school, while unavoidably living with the disadvantages.

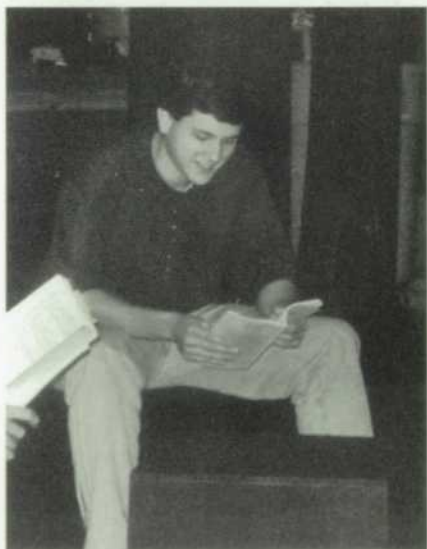

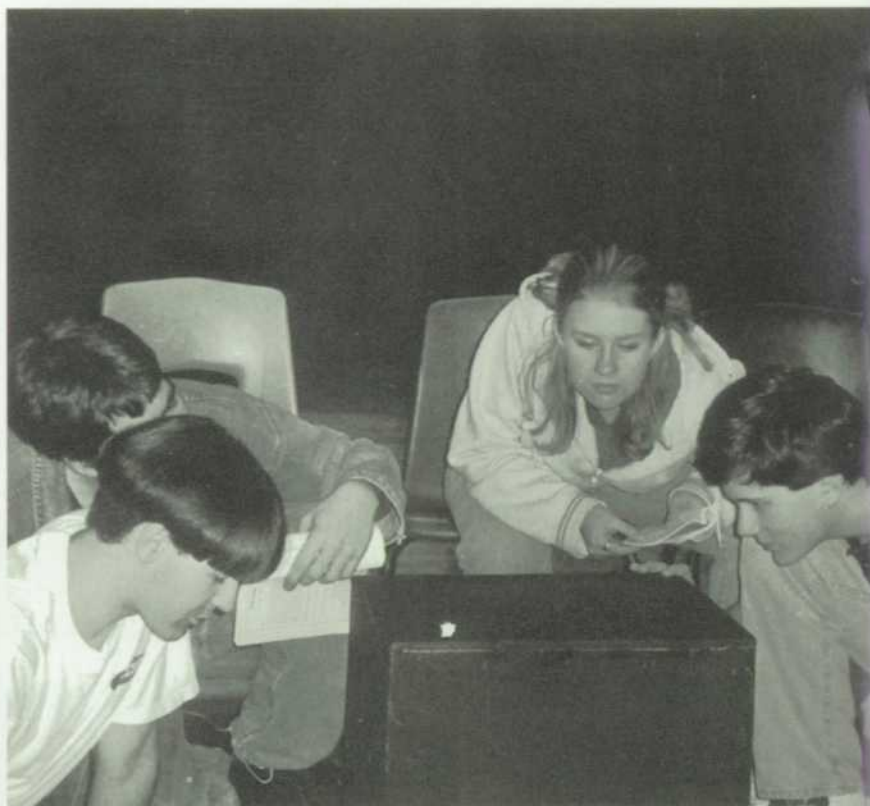
THEATER ARE YOU READY FOR? THEATER

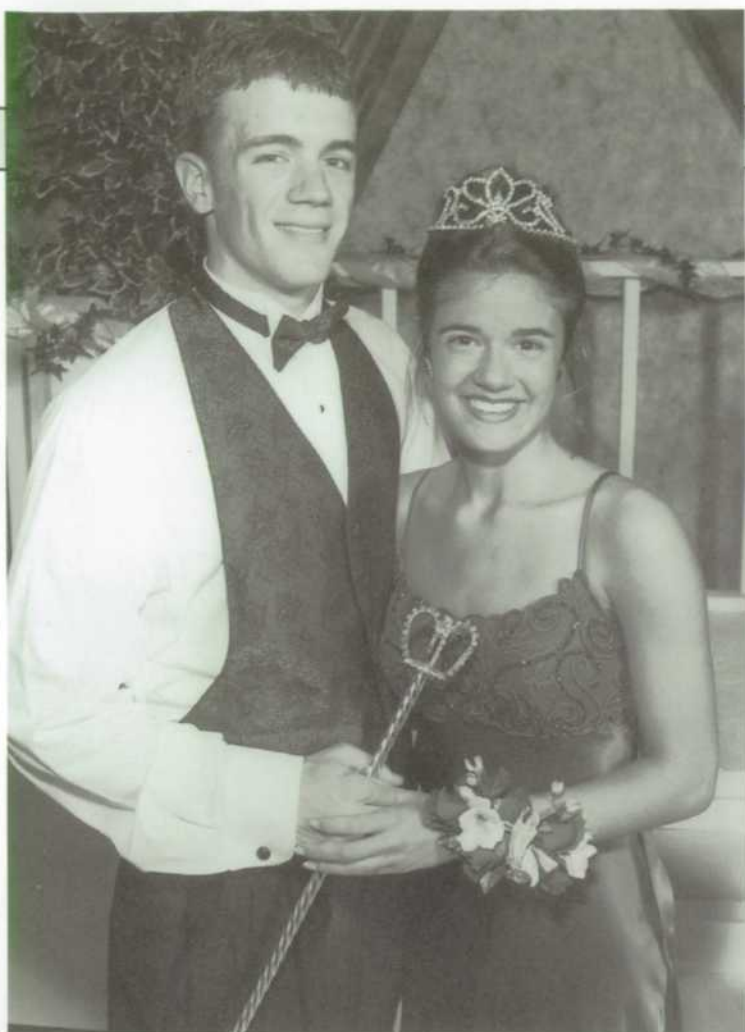

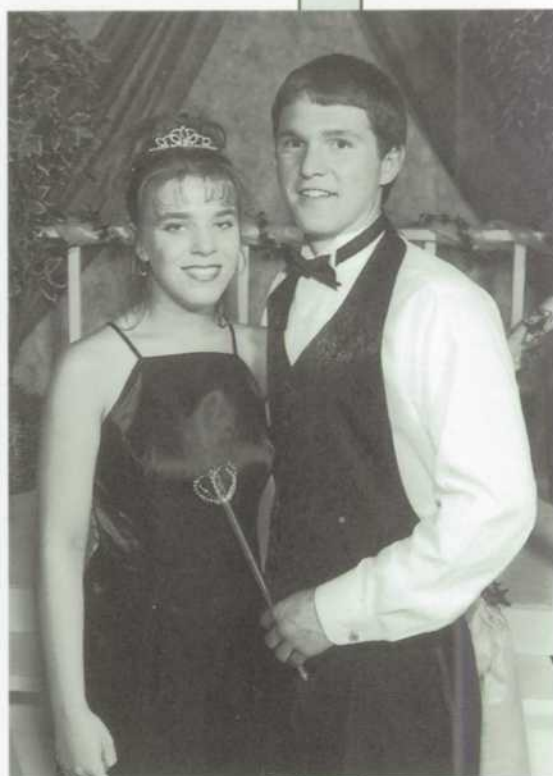

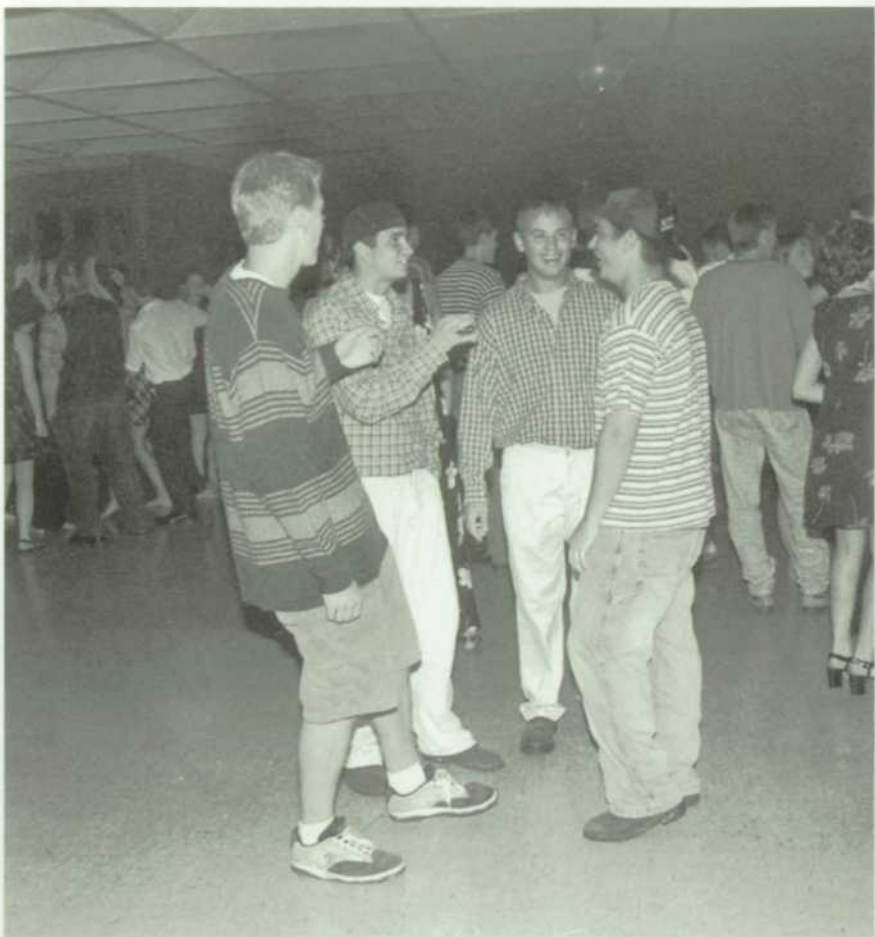

Erin Schulte. The class of 2000 tried to prepare for the future although many hadn't decided yet which direction to take: college or the work force.

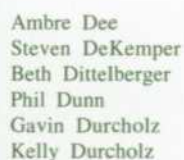
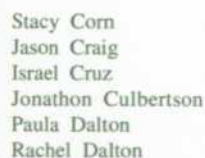
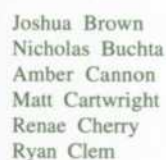

Class of 2001

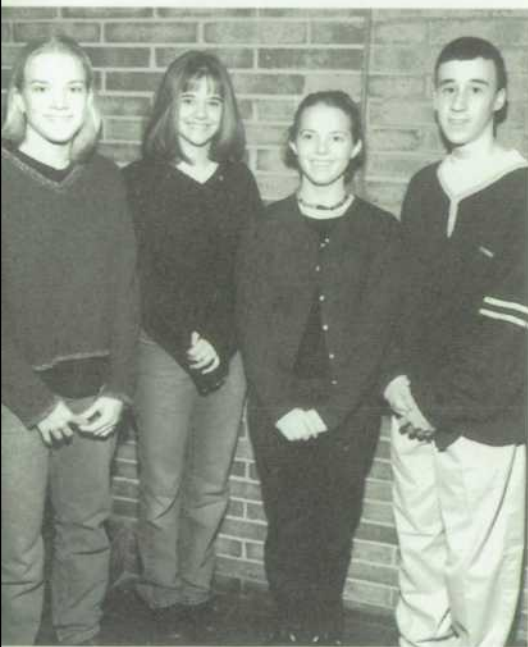
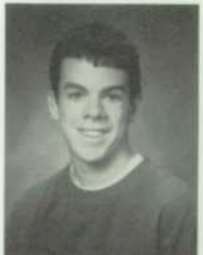

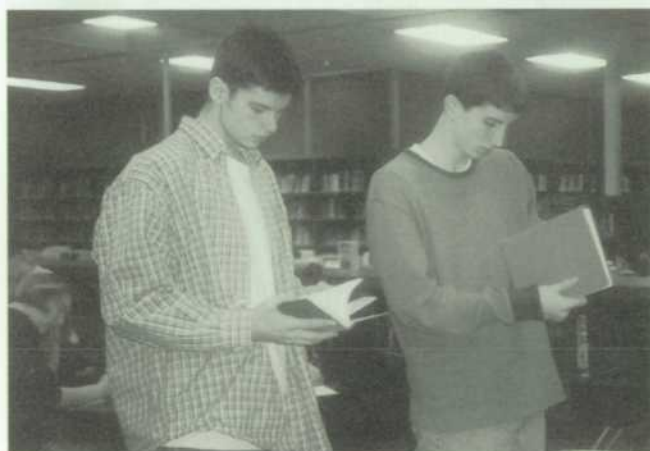

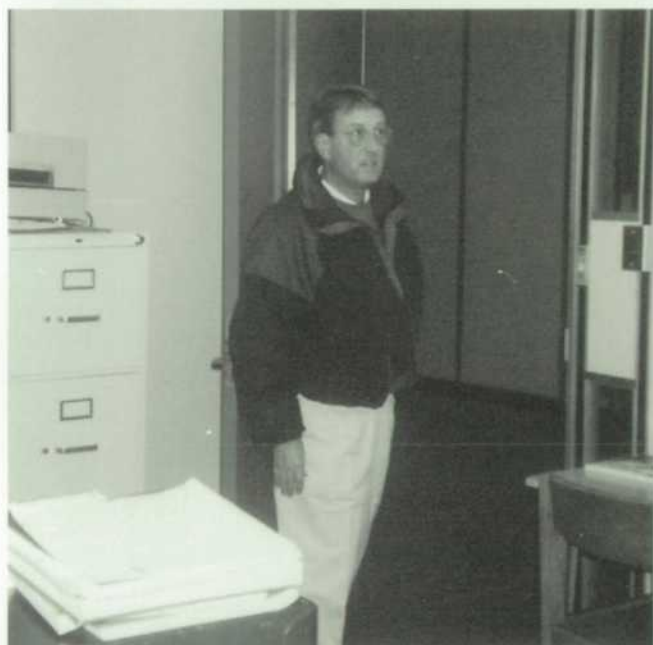

The French students watched movies in French to be further introduced to the language and culture. They also sold candy to fund their need for educational materials.

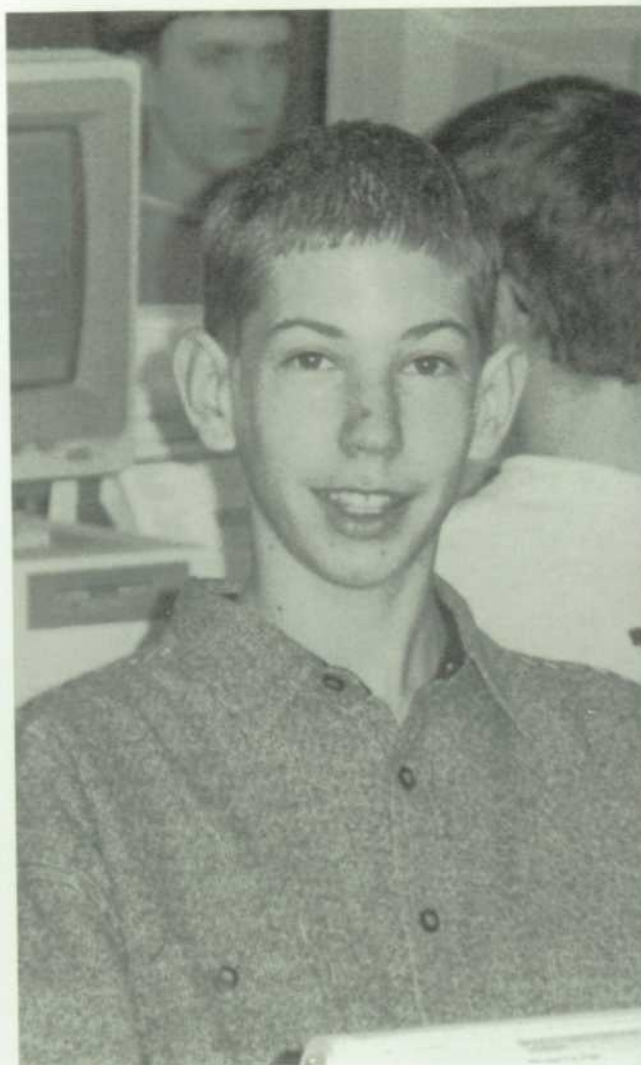
At a competition at USI, our foreign language students fared well. The Spanish team placed second, French third, and German fourth.

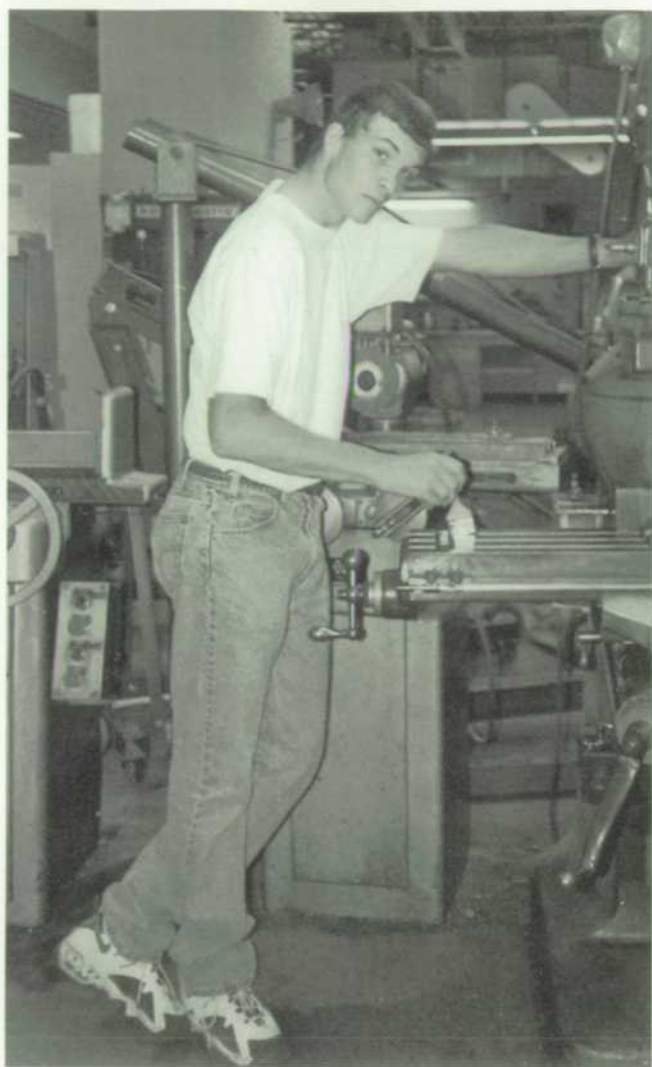
With a variety of different classes, including crafts, textiles, ceramics, sculpture, art history, painting, drawing, and an introduction class, students could choose which one best suited them.

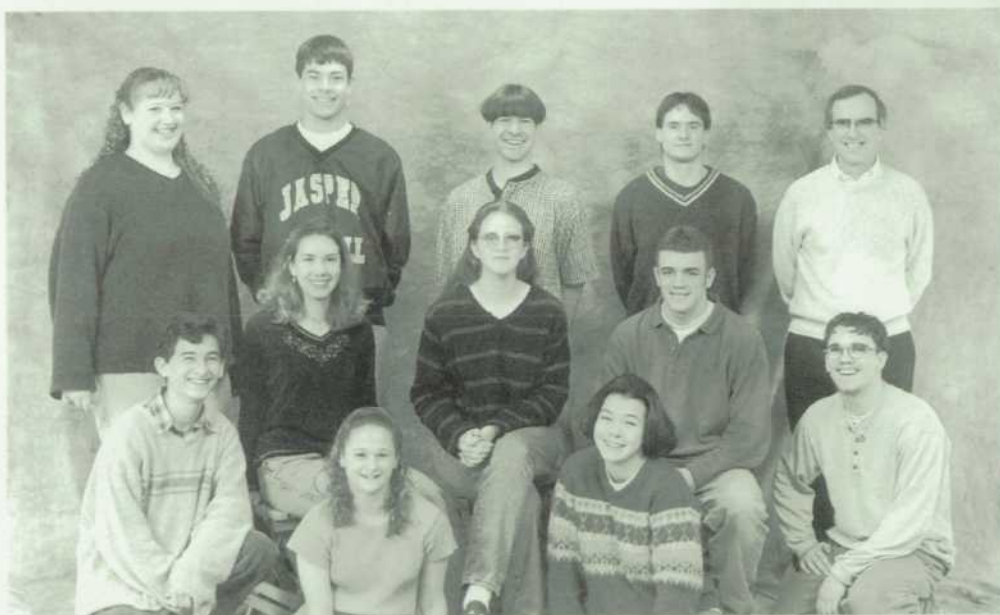

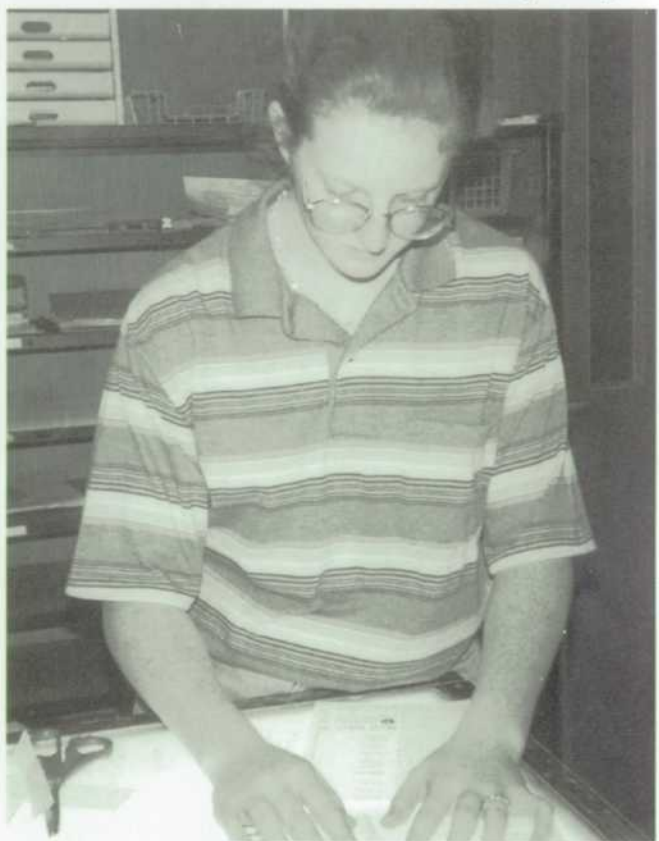

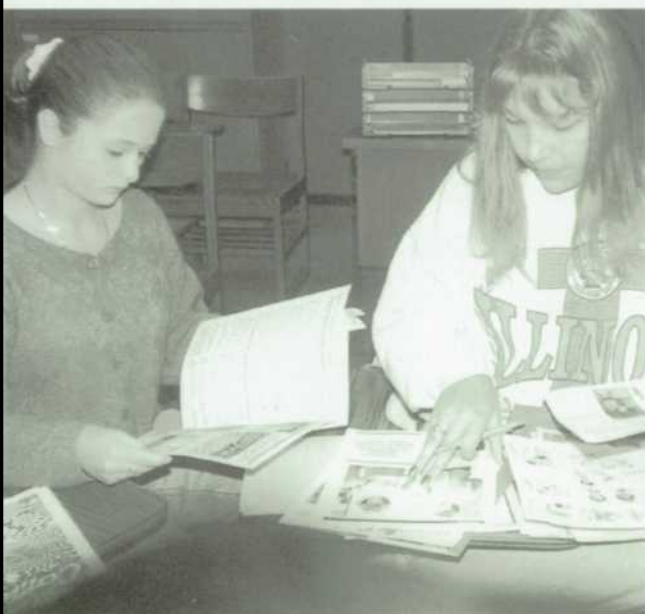

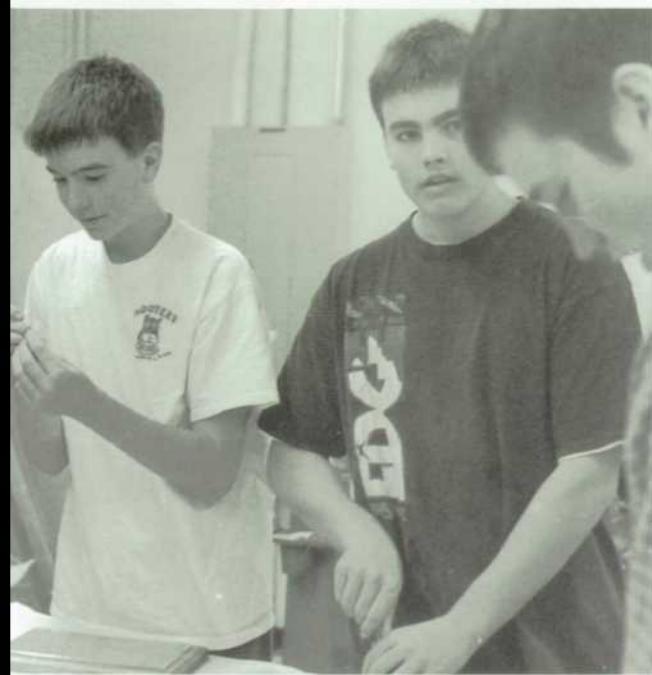

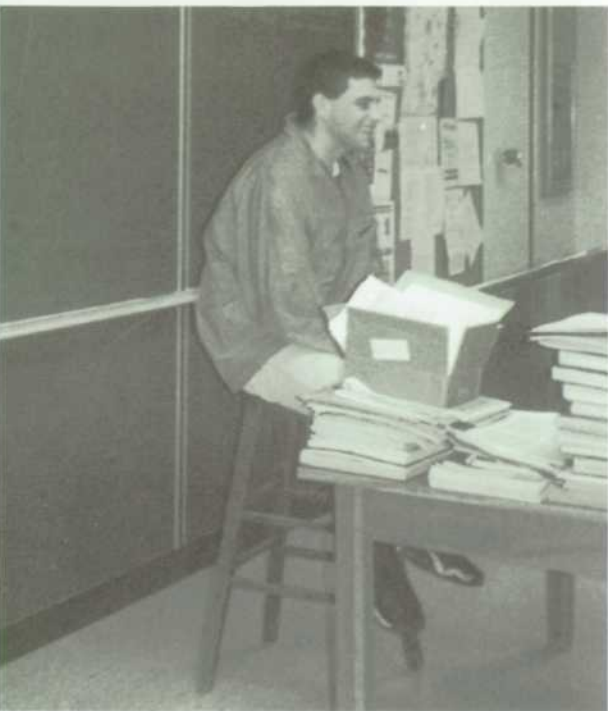

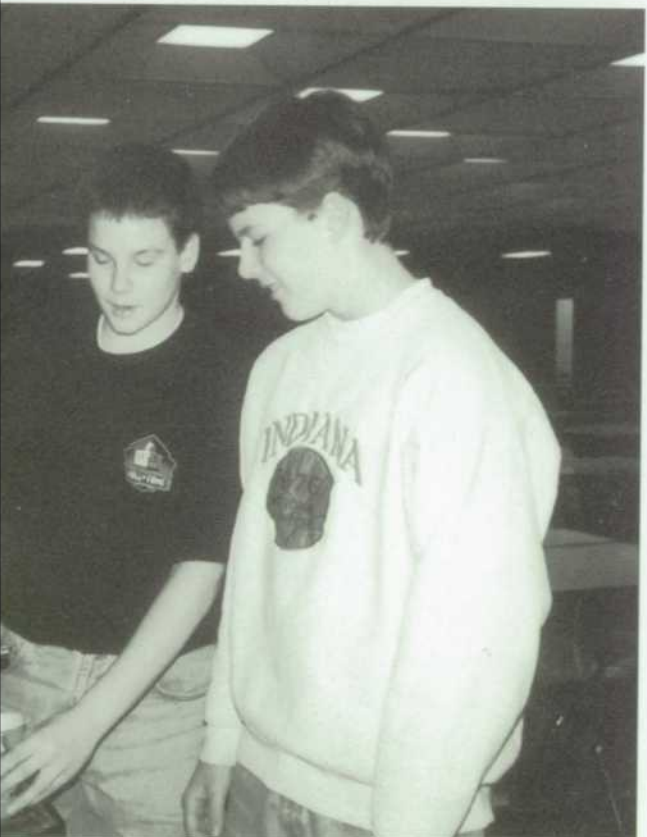

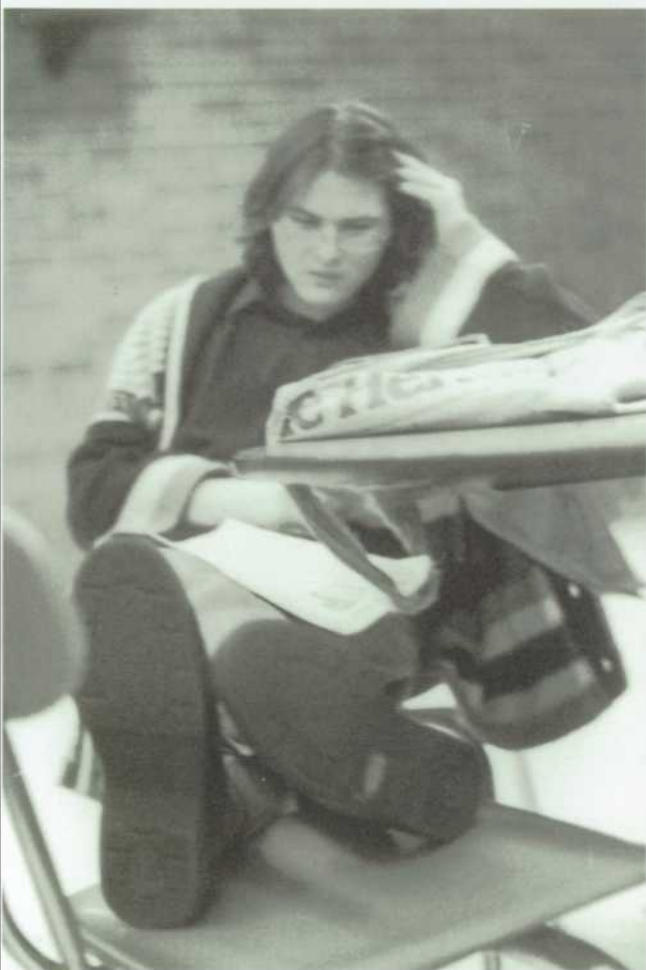

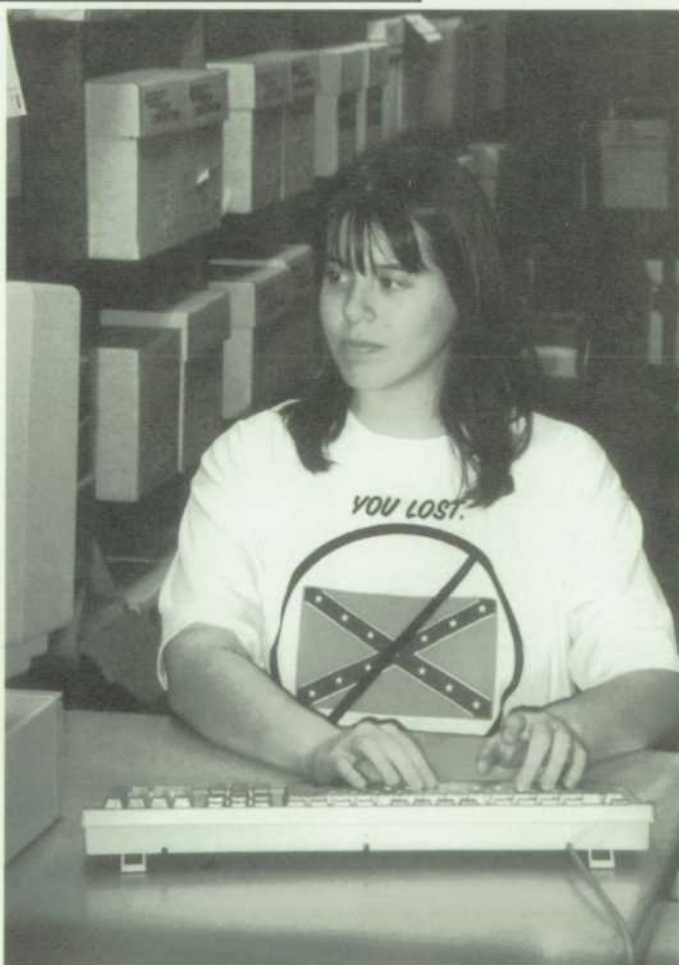

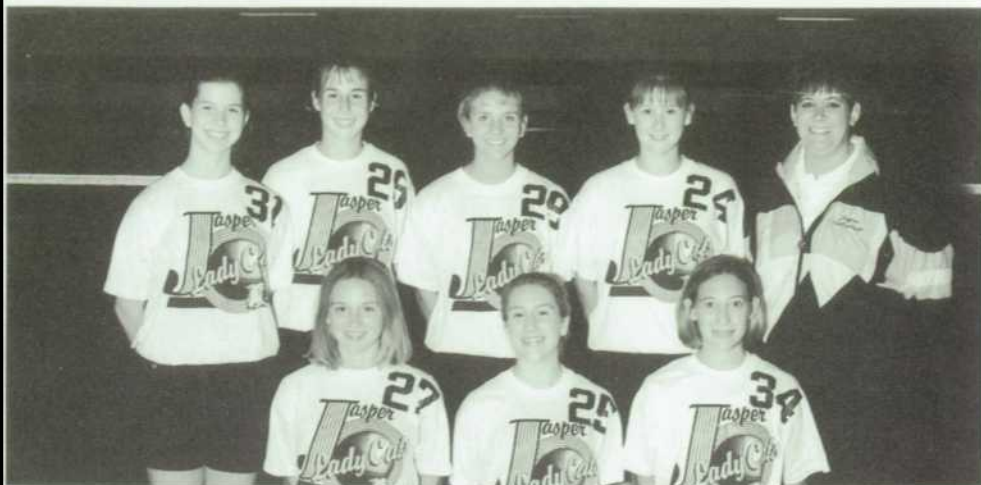

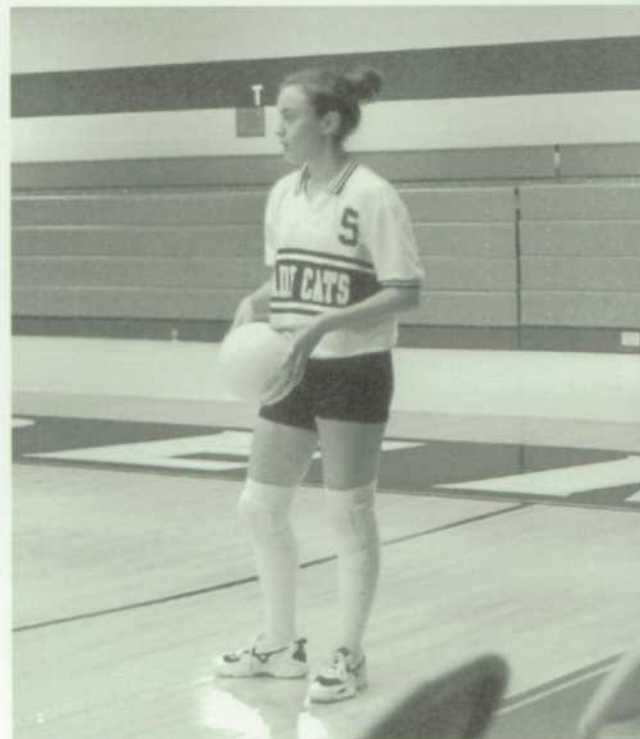

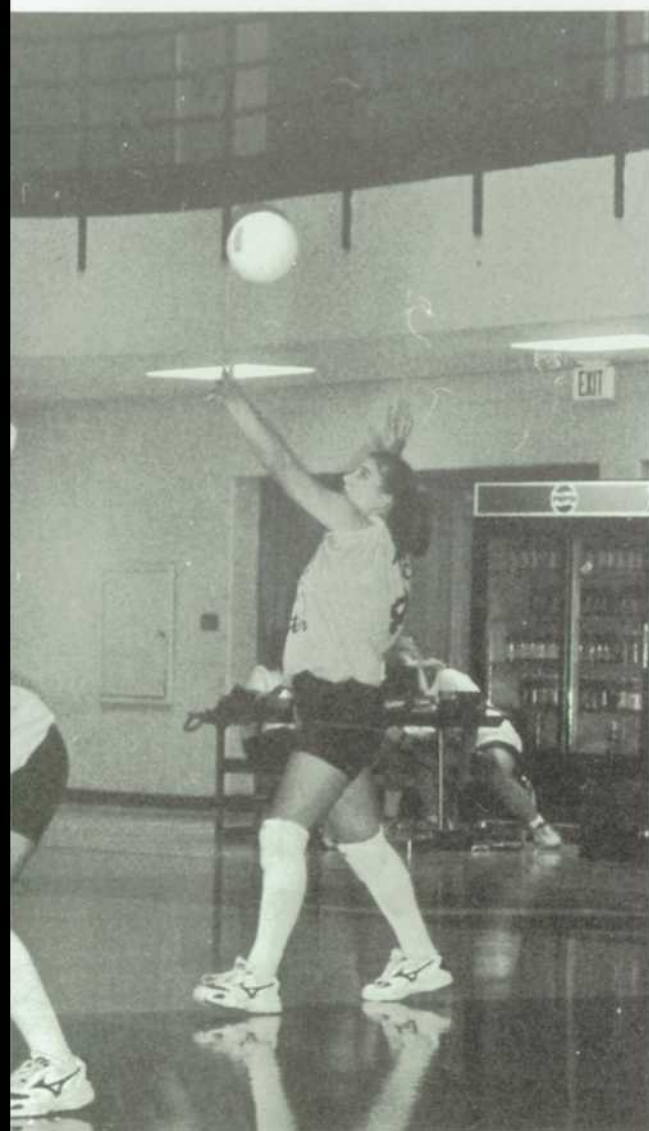

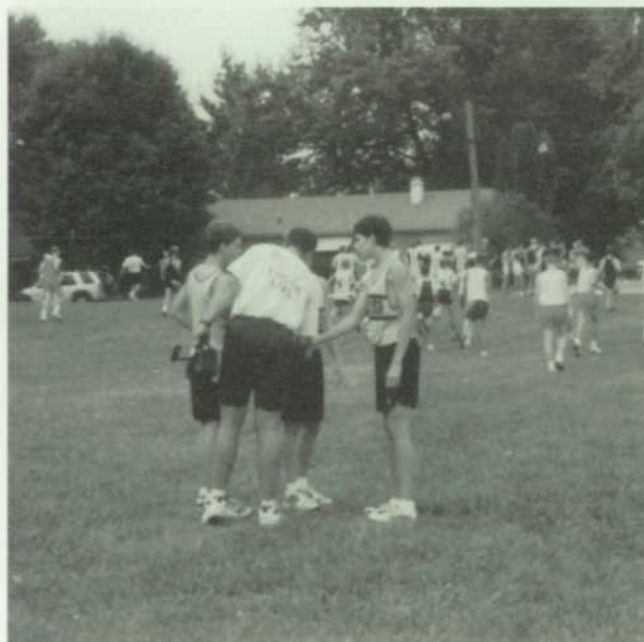

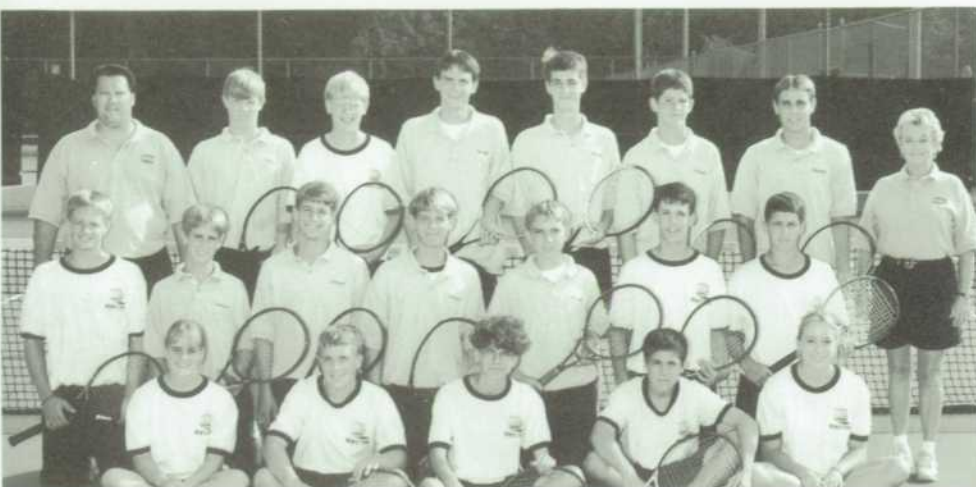

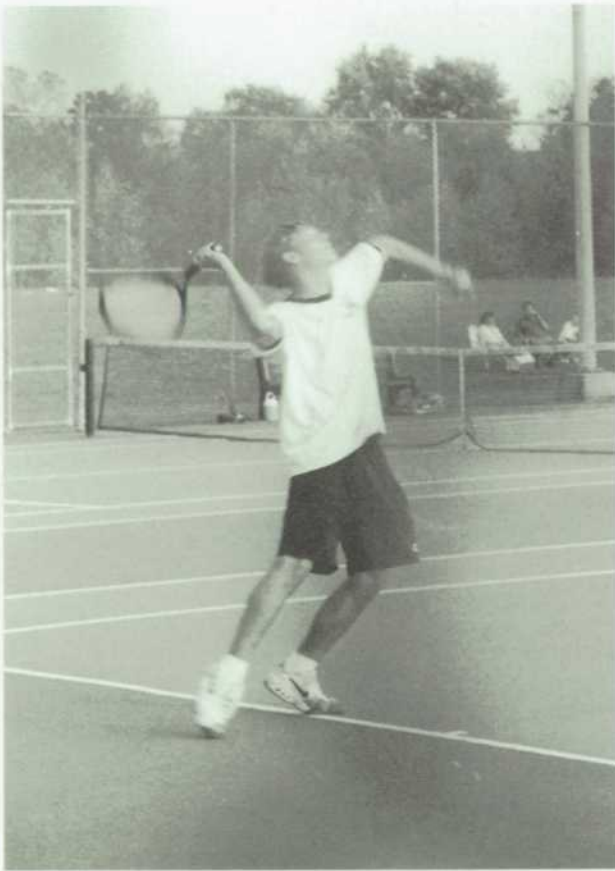

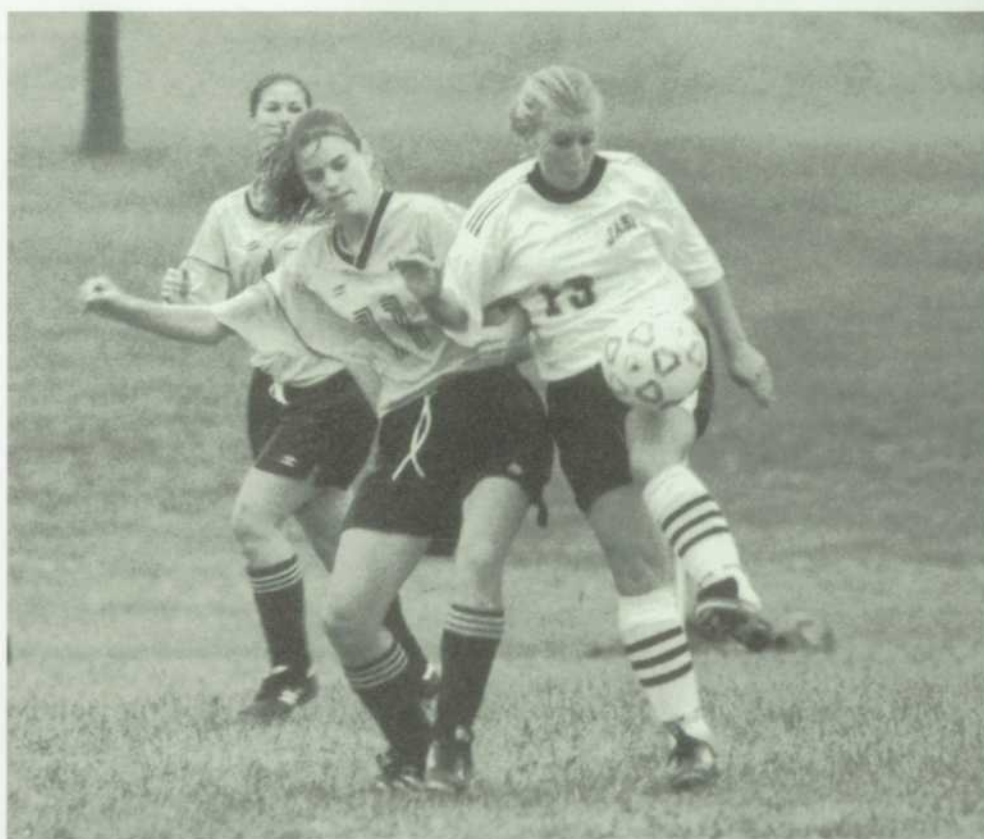


The girls strived not only to improve their skill, but also to give 100% in this year's games and practices.

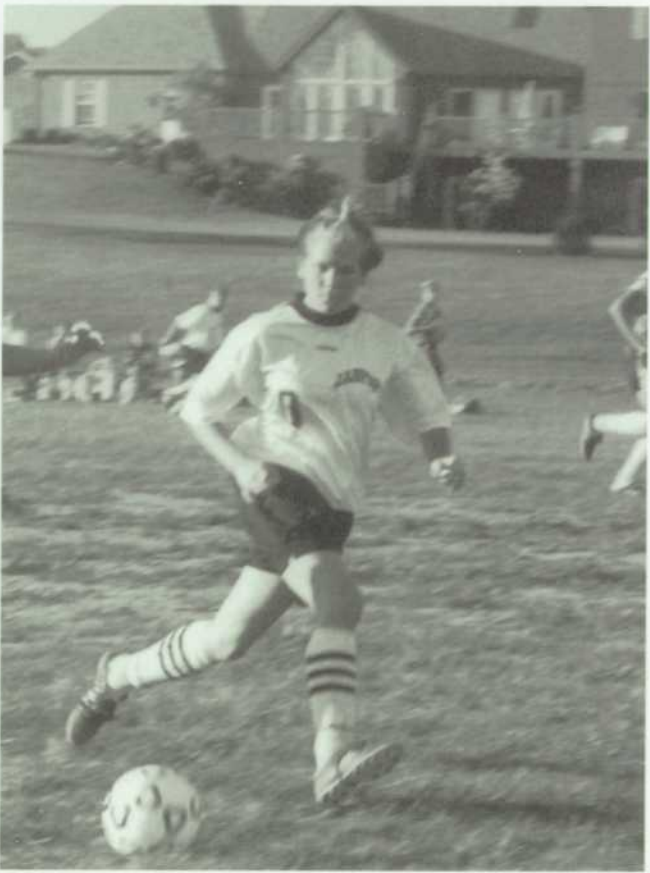

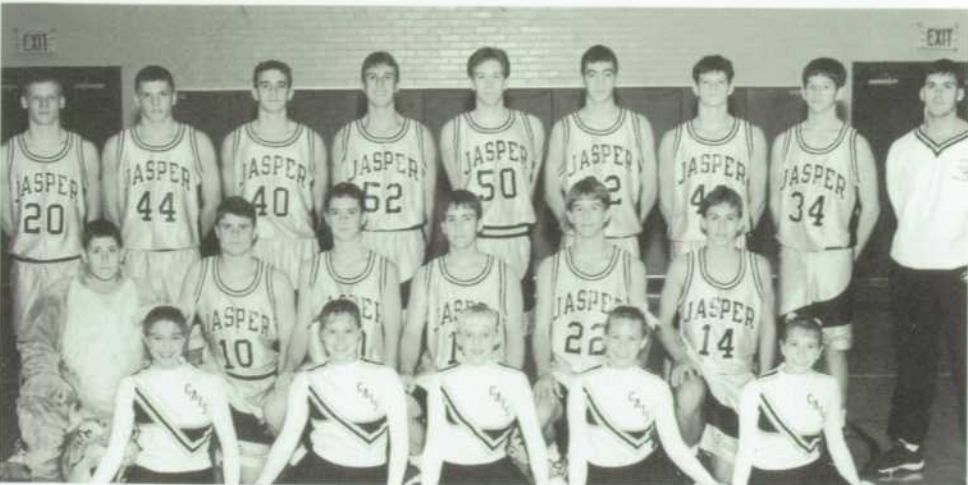

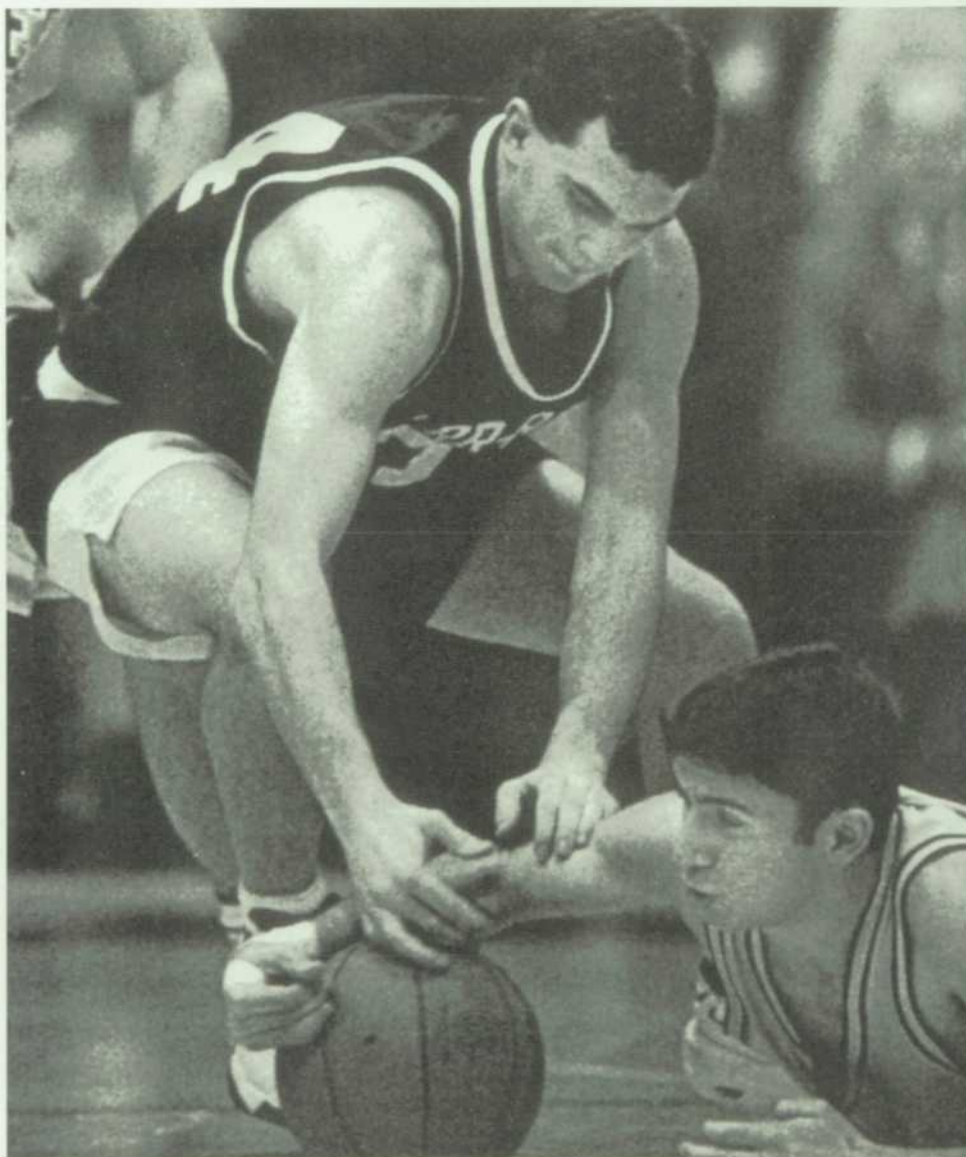

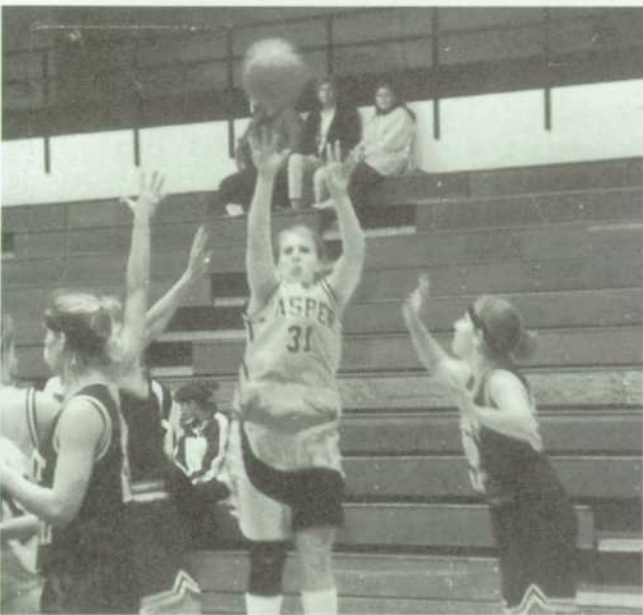

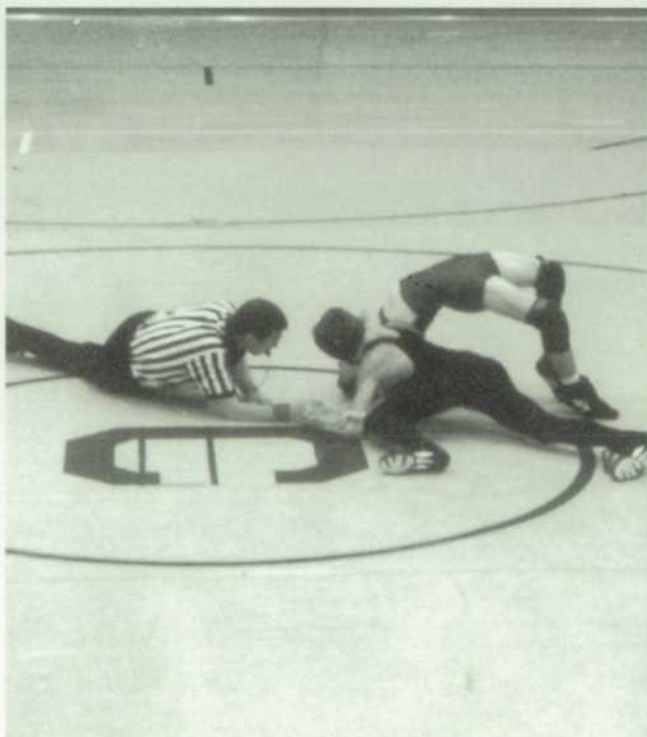

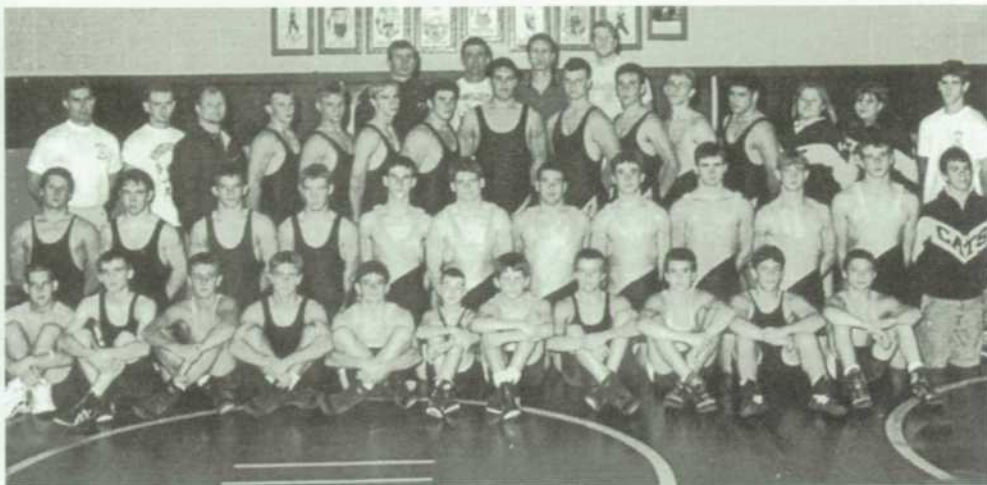


Jace Brescher charges forward with great strength at the state competition.

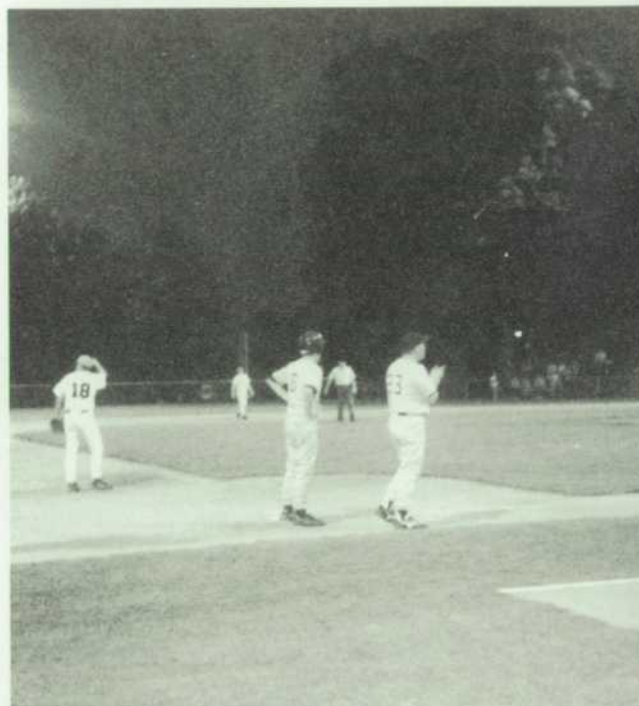

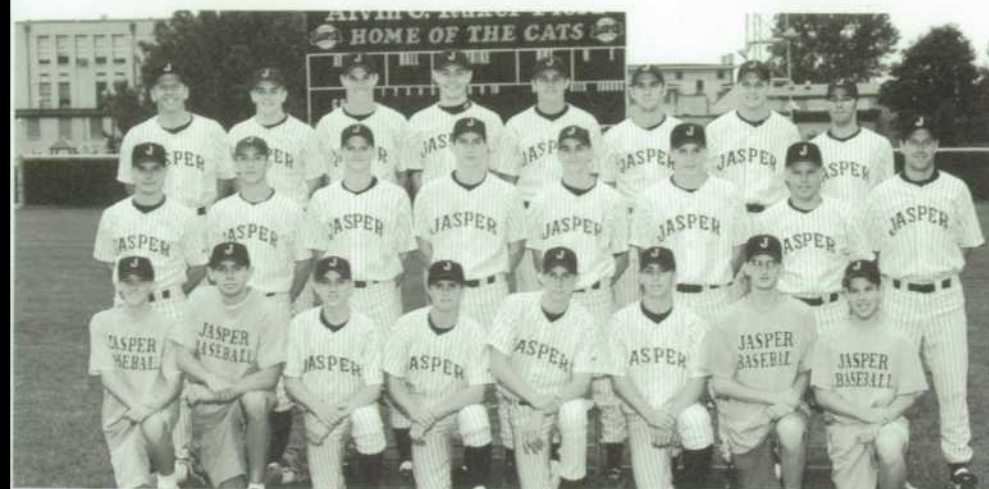

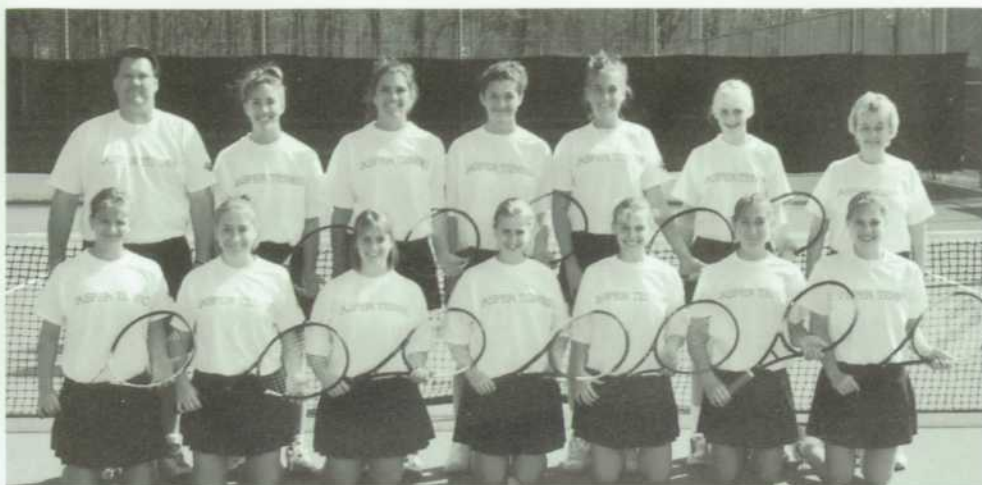

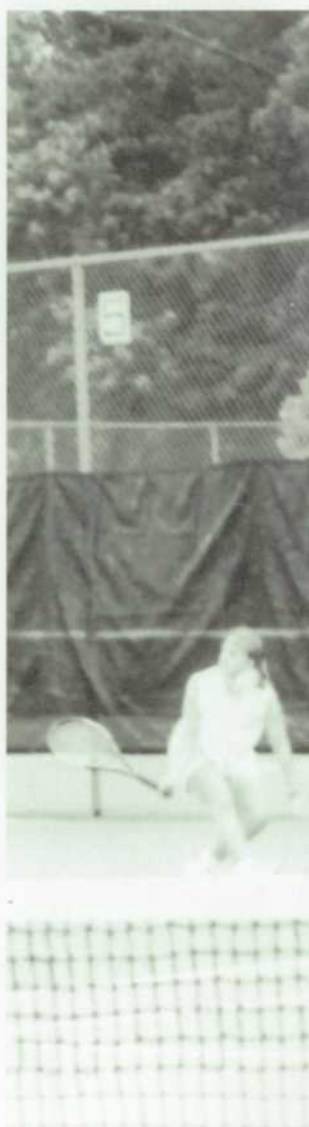
