





JUNE 3

Senate Bill 217 is introduced to require that police wear body cameras and release the footage to the public after any incidents; it also repeals the "fleeting felon rule" that bans choke holds. The other three officers in the Floyd case are charged with second-degree murder.

On March 13, 2020, Mr. Wilson announced over the speakers that the Greater Jasper Consolidated School Corporation was going to be virtual for the next 4 weeks. Unfortunately, school remained virtual for the rest of the year due to a lock down implemented by the Indiana Governor, Eric Holcomb. For the coming school year, changes needed to be made in order to make school COVID-safe. For starters, each student has to wear a mask and get their temperature scanned by a teacher when they walk into the building. To allow teachers plenty of time to arrive at school and prepare for this, Jasper High School has made a big change. In previous years, some students would arrive at school early to finish homework or prepare for tests. Now, if a student wants to come in before 7:30, the only door open is the front entrance. In their classrooms, teachers removed extra desks and spread the remaining desks out to minimize contact tracing. Another change to the school day is the implementation of a third lunch. Because students have to sit every-other-seat, there wasn't enough space in the cafeteria for roughly 500 students in each lunch period. What many students don't know is that this isn't the first time JHS has had three lunches. In the early 2000's, Jasper High School began using the three-lunch system. "I think it was about 2008-2009 it switched back to two lunches," Mrs. Luebbehusen explains the changes that were made when she was relatively new to Jasper High School, "Principal Hacker is the one who switched it back to two lunches." With all the big changes, the 2020-2021 school year is going to be one for the books.






WE BUST OURS TO KICK YOURS

to make it even farther in the postseason next year. The players dealt with the many challenges thrown their way with their heads held high, and it made for a great season.






ANEWMINDSET

Due to COVID-19 canceling their 2020 season, the boys track team went into the 2021 season with a lot of uncertainty. Despite this, they managed to have a pretty successful season. When the boys track team entered the post-season, they were not there to mess around. The boys won the title of IHSAA Sectional Champions. They managed to score a total of 126 points, with Heritage Hills as a close second with 122, and Tell City in third with 113.5. After their sectional win, the Wildcats prepared to tackle the IHSAA Regional meet. With powerhouse New Albany and SIAC Champion Castle in their regional meet, the boys knew they would have to work hard to get the gold. With athletes in 10 events, Jasper managed to grab 20 points from their competitors and land 10th place. Two students from Jasper qualified for the state meet, held at Ben Davis High School in Indianapolis, Junior Abe Eckman qualified for the 3200 meter run (2 miles) and senior Tyler Kelly qualified for the discus throw event. Eckman placed 12th in the 3200 meter run with a time of 9:29.21, and Kelly placed 26th in the discus event with a distance of 125-01.00 feet. Now that the sophomores and freshmen on the team have a season under their belt, the team hopes to come back stronger next season.







CHAMPIONS

Jasper baseball was an underdog all season. Due to COVID-19, the Jasper baseball team was not able to have a true season in 2020. Many believed that Jasper would not go very far in the state tournament in 2021, much less win the state championship. However, the Wildcats managed to not only win the tournament but also finish with a record of 31-2. This season was Jasper baseball's first year back in the Southern Indiana Athletic Conference (SIAC), and they managed to win the conference title undefeated. Jasper also managed to beat other notable teams such as Brebeuf and rival, Southridge. Southridge had several exceptional players, including Colson Montgomery who was drafted to play for the Chicago White Sox over the summer, and Jasper still managed to outplay them in a nailbiter for a final score of 4-3.
