





The girls golf team takes the Wildcat witational by storm Invitational by storm
















The Marching Wildcat Invitational performance is a hit








Red Ribbon Week






The Performing Arts Club brings some humor to the auditorium







Seniors Hannah Seifert, Jalyn Henke, and Alyssa Schwenk used this project as an opportunity to bring light to mental health issues and emotional well-being. Each month, the girls sent a newsletter, titled "Wildcat Wellness", to all JHS students with inspirational quotes, self-care tips, and other important resources. "The main purpose of the newsletter is to let the students at JHS know that there are people who they can talk to about their mental health and people who understand what they're going through," Henke shared. All three knew they wanted to lessen the stigma surrounding mental health, so they decided to work together for a more collaborative project. Although mental health has become a more prominent topic in recent years, there is still a taboo nature in regards to mental well-being and emotional health. Seifert shared, "Without promoting the importance of mental health, our generation-who is faced with more diverse conflicts than previous generations-won't develop the resilience to handle adversity later in life." By spreading awareness about how common mental health issues are, they hope to increase conversation about mental wellness. All three of the girls said they promote self-care to their friends while also making sure to



incorporate self-care-related activities into their own lives. Hopefully, JHS and its students will continue to bring awareness to the stigmatized topic and provide students with a safe space to be honest with themselves and others about their well-being.


JHS celebrates 5 years of comfort dogs





The Jasper Swimming & Diving team hosted the annual 1 triangular meet with Vincennes and South Knox on December 2nd, and both the girls and boys teams came out victorious. The meet was their second of the week and of the season, but their first home meet of the year. The boys won 10 of the 12 events of the evening.

Senior Noah Wagner was the anchor in the 200 freestyle relay, one of the 10 wins the boys claimed for the Wildcats. "Before the race, I was excited and eager to compete with the other relay teams," Wagner said, "After the race, [seeing that we won] made me proud of myself and my teammates." Wagner also took first place in the 200 Individual Medley and the 500 freestyle, and swam alongside the winning 400m freestyle relay team. The boys won all three relay events that evening and finished the night with 162 points, surpassing South Knox's 49 and Vincennes's 44 points to claim a landslide victory at home. Senior Luke Dawkins was the other top earner for the boys, swimming the 200m and 400m freestyle relays with Wagner and taking the 50m freestyle and the 100 breaststroke in his individual events.

The girls won all 12 of their events and earned a total of 180 points to win over South Knox and Vincennes. Both teams look forward to a successful season!





















































This win continued the team's undefeated streak, with 19 of the 20 athletes scoring points and 9 athletes having personal bests. Winning by this large of a margin is rare in the world of track and field, and this important win boosted the team's confidence. While Jasper's girls team didn't win Sectional, some of the athletes on the team advanced to Regional and State, with the 4x100 relay team setting a new school record of 49.53 at the State Finals.

On Tuesday, May 10th, the boys' team competed in the SIAC meet and finished second to Castle by a score of 104 to 119. The boys' team didn't let this stop them though, as on May 19th, the team competed in Sectional and came out on top as the 2022 Track and Field Sectional Champions. Senior athlete Abe Eckman was able to finish first in the 3200m run at Regional and 2nd at State, setting a new school record with a time of 9:01.5. Junior athlete Jaryn Weinel also advanced to State by coming in third at Regional. At the girls' track and field team's Sectional meet, they came in second place, with Forest Park getting first place. All-in-all, both track and field teams had hugely successful seasons, with their 2023 season looking to be even more promising.





For JHS students, junior year continuously proves to be the most difficult. Whether it's the upcoming future preparation or intense AP classes, students seem to find themselves facing challenge after challenge, so we asked students what has made junior year so hard for them. Out of the students surveyed, 34% agreed that the toughest part was staying motivated, 27% said that their AP classes proved to be the most challenging, 19% argued that maintaining a social life was the most difficult, 15% agreed that planning for their future and researching colleges proved to be hard, and a mere 5% of students said the SAT was the biggest cause of their distress during the year.
